Heavy Vote to Be Cast in Springfield

SPRINGFIELD, Nov. 7.—(Special).—With a registration of 1318 in this city, and interest in the state and national elections high, Springfield is expected to cast a heavy vote Tuesday. Estimates have run as high as 1200 ballots in this city between 8 a. m. and 8 p. m. on election day.

Interest in the city election has not been very great, since there is comparatively little opposition. John C. Parker is opposing Mayor W. P. Tyson for the city's chief job. In the race for the four-year councilman's position, W. A. Taylor, Clayton F. Barber, and M. B. Huntly are running, two to be elected. Taylor and Barber are the incumbents. J. E. Cross is running unopposed for the two-year councilmanic term, and I. M. Peterson and W. E. Buell, seeking reelection as city recorder and city treasurer, respectively, are likewise unopposed.

Tuesday will be a legal holiday, and the city hall, postoffice, and other public offices will be closed all day.

Voters who are in line at 8 p. m. will be allowed to cast their ballots, but no one is to enter the voting places after 8 o'clock. Counting will start during the day, so that incomplete returns are expected at 8 o'clock.

Following are the precinct boundaries and voting places:

Precinct one—Everything west of Second street; high school is the voting place.

Precinct two—Between Second and Seventh streets, south of C and of East Main streets. Vote at the city hall.

Precinct three—Between Second and Seventh streets north of C street. Vote at Lincoln school.

Precinct four—East of Seventh street, north of East Main. Vote at Brattain school.

A Cannery Worker Pleads For An Open Rogue River

I am just a cannery worker, a wife and mother. I want to appeal to the wives and mothers of Oregon. I have a sick husband and two small children. Need I say that they are dear to me? When we came here and bought a little ten-acre home on the banks of the beautiful Rogue, no one thought the time would come when men would conspire to close the river. We have worked and saved for years and have our house paid for. We have paid about \$1500.00, but there is \$1,000.00 more due on the land. My husband is an ex-soldier, hurt in the service of his country, yet it seems he cannot get Government help. He has been operated on at the Veterans hospital and must have another serious operation before he can be well. He works hard, often beyond his strength, I try to help him. The folks who run the salmon cannery have been good to us. They have found work that my husband can do, and I also work as a packer. This season I made over \$150, and found time to do my housework and help take care of our garden.

I read an article in the Grange Pass paper, sneering at the little money we packers make. No doubt it does look small to those rich sports who want to close our river, but there must be many a poor woman in Oregon who knows just how much \$150 means, how far it can be made to go, how many groceries it will pay for and clothes and shoes for the little ones, that they may go to school. If this cruel and senseless closing law carries, we will lose our employment, we will lose our home, we will lose everything. There is no hope. There are no other jobs for us. Do you know of any? Will the rich and prosperous sports who come here to fish, find employment for us? No. All they care for is their fine times. They come here with their great, shining cars and their chauffeurs, and should the river close they would not care though I and my little ones should starve, and the pity of it all is that should the river close, the sports would not catch one additional fish. There are fish enough for all, and our men do not catch the steel head salmon that are the sport fish. They are protected by law. When I contemplate the future, I am frantic. I can see our property lost, my sick husband helpless, the gaunt fingers of famine reaching out for our little ones. Won't you wives and mothers help us? Help us by defeating this cruel and monstrous law, and by so doing, help us to live and keep our jobs and pay for our little home. If you fail, and God pity us.

OREGON NEEDS HOOVER

We call your attention to the agitation now being carried on in foreign countries for lowering the American tariff. They want to share our Ninety Billion dollar market for American products, the richest market in all the world. With a democratic administration the tariff wall will be lowered. Americans will be idle. Local factories will be closed to American labor. Foreign factories will be opened. Think it over, Voters.

Oregon's Workers, Farmers and Business Men Should Carry On With Hoover

1. THE TARIFF

The Republican party believes in a high tariff, so that the American market may be preserved to the American producer, which in turn gives employment to the American workman, and he is thereby a supporter of the corner grocery. The republican tariff is an America-for-American's policy. The democratic party advocates a competitive tariff. That kind of a tariff was translated by Mr. Bert E. Haney, leading Oregon democrat in a speech at Portland, when he said he was talking for Roosevelt and the party to be a LOW TARIFF. He said we could get along on no tariff, or at least 50% of the present tariff.

2. LUMBER

Republican Oregon Senators and Republican Congressmen secured the tariff of \$4 a thousand on lumber that is now

opening up our mills and putting men to work. Under democratic rule, they will close again.

3. STOCK RAISING

In the countries to the north and south of the United States there are hundreds of thousands of cattle looking over a tariff wall that keeps them out of the United States. Lower the tariff wall by voting the democratic party into power and those cattle will take the American market.

4. WOOL

Australian growers are holding their wool clip to see if Roosevelt is elected President and the democratic party returned to power. In that case they expect the tariff to be taken off wool and they can come in here to undersell the American grower.

5. AGRICULTURE-HORTICULTURE

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation and the Northwest Grain Growers Corporation are arranging the sale of 15,000,000 bushels of wheat to China. It will be consummated as soon as possible, possibly by election day. Chinese eggs are now excluded from the American market by the tariff. Japanese and Italian cherries are barred from competition for the American market by the tariff. For the first time in years, the growers of cherries in the Willamette Valley this season shipped barrelled cherries at a profit.

6. THE FISHERIES

Last week the President spoke to the people connected with the fisheries of Oregon, and he told them he had asked the Tariff Commission to raise the rate on the importation of Japanese salmon, which is laid down here for one-half the cost of salmon at the American canneries. IT WILL BE DONE.

7. RECONSTRUCTION FINANCE CORPORATION

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation loaned the Hibernia Bank of Portland \$500,000, which enabled that bank to open its doors and released the deposits of 15,000 Portland citizens. 1400 individual farmers in Oregon have received loans of from \$20 to \$400 each. The wool growers of Oregon have borrowed \$1,425,000 from the R. F. C. Dairymen of Oregon borrowed \$1,745,000. More than a million has been loaned to cattlemen's associations. Vegetable growers borrowed \$72,000, and turkey growers \$60,000. The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has aided a total of 4809 banks, trust companies, insurance companies, agricultural credit corporations, and livestock corporations, having 30,900,177 individual members. THREE THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED AND NINETY-ONE of those institutions were located in towns of less than 5000 population. When Hoover put the credit of the U. S. treasury back of the R. F. C. he saved the banks, the depositors and the business of the entire nation.
