

# Webfoots To Meet Southern California Saturday In Olympic Stadium

## OREGON TEAM WILL LEAVE WEDNESDAY FOR CRUCIAL TILT

Happy over their smashing victory at Corvallis Saturday and sobered by the knowledge that they will meet the national championship Trojans this week, the Oregon Webfoots settled down to work Monday afternoon. They will leave Wednesday night for Los Angeles, where they are to tangle Saturday afternoon with Southern California in Olympic stadium.

Undeclared ex-Stan Kostka, capt for the "Guke" upset at the hands of U. C. L. A., the Webfoots are given an outside chance of knocking over Howard Jones' powerful Trojans. The Oregon State game last week has installed confidence in the team and though it was a hard struggle, no serious injuries were received.

Popeye Popenjak, who was taken out of the game after he had been knocked unconscious, was not badly damaged, and none of the others were crippled up.

**Defeat Forgotten**  
When Prink Callison, youthful Oregon coach, returned to Eugene after the game Saturday night, he found the city in a state of excitement over the victory. "Prink" had done what the great Dr. Clarence W. Spears could not do, beat Oregon State, and the fans here were perfectly willing to forgive and forget the U. C. L. A. defeat.

Stan Kostka, giant halfback who proved a great defensive player and blocker, did not carry the ball to any great extent during the Oregon State game, but will probably be given much of the offensive work in the south. The game will be played on the dry turf field in Los Angeles and Kostka's speed will probably be used to good advantage.

Mark Temple, flashy little halfback who has been doing a man's job on the varsity for two years, is at last receiving some of the credit due him following his sensational 65-yard run. Mike Mikulak, fullback, got the hang of ball carrying Saturday for the first time and to his stellar defensive ability was added a marked ability on offense.

While Oregon was beating Oregon State Saturday afternoon, Southern California was running over California to the tune of 27 to 7 and Jimmy Phelan's Washington Huskies, who battled Oregon to a scoreless tie in Portland were slapping down Stanford, 18 to 13. The Washington State Cougars were beating Idaho, 12 to 0, and U. C. L. A. and Montana were idle.

Besides the game between Oregon and the Trojans Saturday, Washington and Washington State will meet in Seattle Saturday afternoon. U. C. L. A. will play a non-conference game with St. Mary's in Los Angeles Friday afternoon. Stanford will meet the California Aggies and California will meet Idaho. Oregon State will play Montana while enroute to New York for a clash with Fordham.

## HIGHCLIMBER Takes 'em over

The new water wagon, purchased for Oregon and Oregon State football teams by Aaron Frank and Phil Jackson, Portland sportsmen, came in for a good deal of attention at the Corvallis game Saturday afternoon. The wagon, painted in the team's colors, carry a compressed air tank so that water can be sprayed out of the little tubes on the side. The nozzles can be regulated to get a steady stream or a spray of water, as desired, and a large wire tray on top of the carts permit frost towels to be carried ready for use.

As a matter of fact, Oregon's new vehicle is a water wagon, and Oregon State is a water cart. L. H. Gregory, sports editor of the Oregonian, had a hand in this water vehicle business, and though the machines are the same except for color, he had dubbed one a wagon and the other a cart for the sake of identification. He said that as it may, Oregon's water wagon is a great convenience and so is Oregon State's water cart.

Oregon employs two men to push the cart, while Oregon State uses only one Saturday. The Beaver water cart pushes rain into difficulties in the mud once or twice but the two Webfoot water wagon pushers got along fine. Bill Hayward has suggested the use of an outboard motor during Oregon-Oregon State games, which are always played in the mud.

Oregon State has installed a telephone system in the Bell field press box which permits the sports writers to "tune in" on the information being relayed from the field. One man from each school works on the telephone and follows the play up and down the field, giving accurate information on plays, yardage gained and so on. The system in the press box is so arranged that anybody may cut in with his private earphone, which is furnished.

Art Taft, publicity director for the Beaver football team, is responsible for the telephone system, which is the ultimate in modern press box conveniences. Incidentally, Taft proved the perfect host Saturday and everyone was much impressed by the Oregon State hospitality.

We all enjoyed a laugh at Taft's expense when Jarvis, Beaver halfback, trotted onto the field. Taft had sent out the story earlier in the week that Jarvis was suffering from appendicitis. Somebody suggested that any time Oregon State was worried about Jarvis' appendix, they could take it out of the alcohol and look at it, as it was removed at a Portland hospital two years ago.

Taft says he merely relayed the information given out by the coach. Schiller should have called it tonsillitis instead. They sometimes grow back in.

The Oregon freshman football season is over. A conference agreement prohibits frosh games being played later than the Saturday following Armistice day. A game between the Oregon frosh and Howard Hobson's Southern Oregon normal team was considered, but the normal schoolers are booked up until Thanksgiving day. Hobson would have liked to book a game for that day and so would Schulz and Mauerud, frosh coaches, but the conference ruling will not permit it to be played.

The story of how little Shorty Hahn came to win a place for himself as guard on the frosh team this year is good. It seems that neither Schulz nor Mauerud paid much attention to the little gent when he turned out. One day they called for all the guards to line up for springing practice, and the 155-pounder lined up with the group.

The coaches got a laugh out of it and remembered him a couple of days later when the regular right guard was dogging it. "That big guard is laying down on the job," said Schulz. "Let's insult him by starting little Shorty in his place and maybe he'll snap out of it."

So Hahn was given the starting call in scrimmage practice, and he's been in there ever since. He smacks 'em hard, and he fills up his place in the line. Shorty played end back on defense in the frosh

games this year, and gave a good account of himself. He'll be out for the varsity next year.

Two local wrestlers, George "Wildcat" Pete and Walter "Sneez" Achiu, are given high ratings by the national wrestling association, according to the official rankings announced recently. Pete is classed as a middleweight, and Achiu is listed with the welterweights, though both prefer to wrestle in the junior middleweight division, of which Pete is champion. Junior middleweight rankings are not given out by the national association.

Jack Reynolds is world's champion of the welterweight division, with others listed in the following order: "Wildcat" McCann, Bobby Roscoe, Billy Hallis, Hy Sherman, Cal Farley, Jack Gorman, Billy Thom, Silent Rattan, Tetsura Higami, Loung Tin-Kit (Walter Achiu, to you), Ray Meyers, Sato Fujita, Johnny Stots, Robin Reed, Cyclone Burns, Henry Jones, Jack McLaughlin, Ernie Arthur and Das Andersen. Gus Kallio is world's champion in the middleweight division, with Waldo Ketonen next. Others are listed in the following order: Henry Kolin, Joe Parsill, Bobby Bylund, Bob Myers, Jack Miller, Joe Reno, Yaqul Joe, Sammy Cohen, Bunny Martin, Buck Weaver, Mervin Barackman, Wildcat Pete, Leo Webber, Ralph Percut, Les Fishbaugh, Red Simms, Charley Carr and Gus Johnson.

Eugene wrestling fans may disagree with the association concerning many of these rankings. Robin Reed, for instance, has probably been put well down in the welterweight list because of his quarrel with the association. Wildcat McCann, though a fine wrestler, is probably not as good as Walter Achiu. These rankings, however, are made on last year's performances and Achiu did not wrestle many matches in association territory last year.

Pete, junior middleweight champion, does well to get a high ranking in the middleweight division, which includes men wrestling from six to ten pounds over Pete's weight.

## Huskies Prepare To Meet Cougars

SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Jubilant in a sensational victory over Stanford, the Washington Huskies leave home today to prepare for what promises to be a bitter struggle against Washington State here Saturday.

Assistant Coach Pest Welch said the Cougars worked "under wraps" in beating Idaho by two touchdowns in the mud on Rogers field at Pullman. He predicted the Huskies would have a real afternoon of it trying to stop Ollie Arbelbide and George Sander, great running and passing packs. Washington came through the 15 to 13 win over Stanford without injury.

## PETE AND ACHIU DEADLOCKED OVER PLANS FOR MATCH

Herb Owen, promoter for the Eugene wrestling commission, will stage a card for the war veteran's organizations Friday, Armistice day, but he can't announce it yet. Owen was at work Monday ironing out difficulties between the two wrestlers and hoped to announce the card soon.

Thor Jensen, big thunder and lightning man from Elkhart, will be unable to tackle Pete for another 10 days or two weeks. The loud-speaking grappler is still laid up with a shoulder injury as the result of his run-in with the mob following his match with Achiu.

A match between Wildcat Pete and Walter Achiu, the Chinaman, has been requested from many points but Achiu is unwilling to meet Pete unless the Wildcat's world championship belt is at stake.

Weight Bothers  
Pete says he's willing to meet Achiu but doesn't want to make the weight for a belt match until after he has settled his score with Jensen. Pete is weighing around 155 pounds and wants to stay that way until after his Jensen match as Thor tips the beam at more than 160 pounds. The Wildcat would be required to drop below 154 pounds to defend his belt.

The grapplers were deadlocked Monday, with Owen trying to bring them together. Both Achiu and Pete are local boys but each is jealous of the other's reputation. Pete is rated among the nation's first 10 middleweights by the national wrestling association while Achiu is rated among the first ten welters.

To attain these ratings, Pete has had to wrestle men much heavier than himself in the middleweight division, while Achiu has had to reduce below his normal wrestling weight to work in the welterweight division. At their normal weights of 154 pounds, each is well high invincible and if the two could be brought together again Friday, the veterans would have one of the greatest matches that can be arranged.

## TROJANS FAVORED OVER WEBFOOTS IN SATURDAY CONTEST

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Two southern California football eleven maintained their strangle hold on the Pacific coast conference leadership today as they turned into another week of grid gyrations with only a remote possibility of an immediate change in the situation.

The University of California at Los Angeles eleven, idle over the week-end, will hold the local spotlight with a non-conference struggle with St. Mary's on Armistice day.

University of Southern California takes another stand in defense of its national and conference titles at the Olympic stadium on Saturday against one of the strongest teams in the northwest, Oregon. After their 27-7 triumph over California here before the season's record crowd of 75,000 Saturday, there were few who believed the Webfoot had a chance against the House of Troy.

The Galloping Gaels will return to the west for the Bruin tussle Armistice day with blood in their eyes. The setback handed them by Fordham, plus their defeat by Coach Bill Spaulding's proteges last year, serve as the setting.

In defeating California, S. C. demonstrated it still has a great defense, and a smart offense, despite the loss of Orville Mohler, although the Trojan goal line was crossed for the first time this year due to the Bear passing attack.

Griffith of Southern California with his three touchdowns Saturday jumped into the lead for individual scoring honors of the Pacific coast conference running his total to 30. Mark Temple of Oregon is close behind with 25 while Palmer of U. S. C. and Moses of Washington State come next with 18 each.

## Shaver Sees Webfoots Win

Gains Shaver, who won all-American honors on the Southern California football team last year, was in the press box at Corvallis Saturday afternoon "looking over" the Oregon squad as the Webfoots triumphed over Oregon State.

Oregon and Southern California are to meet in Los Angeles Saturday. Shaver said he wasn't "scouting" the team but was just looking Oregon over, but admitted he would report his observations to Coach Howard Jones. Shaver did not chart the Oregon plays as other Trojans scouts have handled that task.

Gains, known as Gus, was impressed by the Webfoot power and no doubt had an interesting report to make on this year's Oregon team. He claimed the Trojans another Oregon last year, 53 to 0.

## THE DALLES HIGH PLAYER IS BARRED

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—(AP)—George Starr, halfback of The Dalles high football team, was disqualified until Dec. 23, according to a decision reached at the end of a 12-hour session of the Oregon State high school athletic association board of control at Corvallis Saturday.

The announcement of the disqualification and the awarding of the game between The Dalles and Hood River, which ended in a scoreless tie, to the Hood River squad was made by John L. Gary, secretary of the board.

In brief a statement issued following the meeting stated that the board had decided that Starr had taken articles of an intrinsic value of approximately \$13 for engaging in boxing bouts at The Dalles, the acts violating an association ruling. It also stipulated that The Dalles should forfeit all games played to date.

The winners will be announced this week.

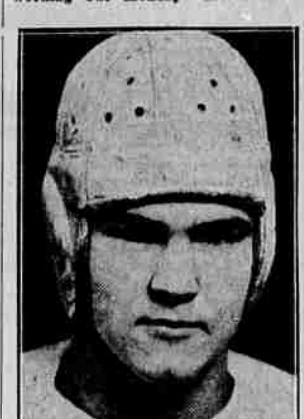

## EUGENE HIGH TO PLAY SALEM TEAM FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Back home after losing to Medford Saturday afternoon, Fritz Kramer's Eugene high school team started working out Monday afternoon in

preparation for their annual Eugene-Salem contest to be staged in the capital city Friday afternoon, Armistice day.

Their defeat Saturday afternoon was only the second of the season and may have been the result of an over-ambitious schedule. Eugene high had triumphed over Corvallis high school here Thursday evening, and two games in one week may have been a little too big an order.

**Statistics About Even**  
In spite of the 19 to 0 score in favor of Medford however, the statistics show that Eugene high stacked up very well against the southerners. Medford made a total of 244 yards in the game to 210 for Eugene. Eugene made 8 first downs to 7 for Medford. Medford made 160 yards from scrimmage and Eugene made 152 yards. Eugene threw 16 passes and completed four for a total of 58 yards. Medford threw nine passes and completed three for a total of 84 yards. Each had a pass intercepted.

Eugene carried the ball 52 times during the game to Medford's 39. Eugene was thrown for losses totaling 20 yards. Medford lost 11. Eugene was penalized 45 yards to Medford's 20. Medford returned Eugene's punts for a total of 135 yards. Medford returned Eugene's kicks for a total of 70 yards. Two of Eugene's kicks were partially blocked.

Medford's first touchdown was made by Fichtner, Medford fullback, after a series of passes put the ball in scoring territory. In the second half, Eugene took the ball to the Medford 8-yard line but could not score. Glinksky, of Medford, ran 50 yards on a fake punt from his own 10-yard line and then passed to Bennett for the second Pear-Pickers score. In the final period, Glinksky returned Brown's punt 70 yards for a touchdown.

High Mercer, Dick Bishop, Leonard Brown, Elton Owen, Perkins and J. Mercer worked in the backfield for Eugene during the game. Bishop carried the ball 14 times for a total of 51 yards. Hugh Mercer carried the ball 11 times for a gain of 21 yards. Brown carried the ball 9 times for a gain of 24 yards. Owen carried the ball 10 times for a gain of 44 yards. Perkins carried the ball four times for a gain of two yards.

**Leaders to Meet**  
Two of the four eastern candidates, Columbia and Brown, clash at New York Saturday. Colgate should be a little difficult with Syracuse. Pittsburgh faces a hard fight with Nebraska.

Tennessee and Vanderbilt battle out for survival at Nashville, the third southern aspirant, also tackles Florida.

Southern California will receive acid test against Oregon, and U. C. L. A., the other Pacific coast conference leader, will have a showdown with St. Mary's, they Friday.

Texas Christian plunged into the hardest fight on its schedule and the University of Texas Longhorn with the southwest conference virtually at stake.

On the Pacific coast, State beaten three times in succession tackles the California Aggies, Washington and Washington State will furnish a close fight.

## Vote 308 X Yes ON A BILL PROHIBITING COMMERCIAL FISHING ON ROGUE RIVER

The following excerpt from a letter from Henry O'Malley, Commissioner of the United States Bureau of Fisheries, constitutes a conclusive argument in favor of the passage of the Rogue River Fish Bill.

"I strongly feel that the Rogue River, as well as the other salmon rivers in Oregon, should be closed to commercial fishing if it is hoped to maintain the rivers in anywhere near their original productivity. These rivers are not unlike the rivers of Alaska, and we do not permit any fishing in any of our rivers in the north. In fact, some of them are closed a mile or more outside their mouths. I believe that the fish in the rivers should be left there to reproduce their species. This would give the steelhead trout, which is largely a game fish, an opportunity to perpetuate itself and furnish sport and food for the people of Oregon and the thousands of tourists who are now seeking the great out-of-doors. These tourists will prove to be one of the valuable assets of the state of Oregon."
