The Lytton report made by the commission of enquiry to the league of nations on the Manchurian situation has just been received at the University of Oregon library and can be found in the league of nations document, number 32, it is announced by H. H. Douglas, librarian. The room is open from 2 to 5 p. m. on Monday and from 9 a. m. to 12 noon on Tuesday. Other books of interest which have been added to this collection recently include "World Economic Survey," "Review of World Production," and "Unemployment." An editorial was run recently in the New York Herald-Tribune that has caused considerable comment and praise from the scouts. The editorial is as follows:

The Girl Scouts
"If there were any question of feminine pluck it would have an answer in the response of the Girl Scouts to hard times. The leaders take the view that the organization in time of stress is more than ever indispensable. Expressing their attitude, Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, chairman of the board of directors, said yesterday at the opening of the Girl Scout national convention in Norfolk:

"The task of the social agencies is to preserve the human values, to supply a new mold for building the kind of character that was developed in the pioneer home. Such a mold is to be found in the Girl Scout laws, with their insistence on the time-honored virtues of honesty, thrift, cheerfulness, loyalty, kindness and courage. These are not luxuries. They are necessities, particularly now, and any relief program which did not embody some means of preserving them would be a program that piled up for some future day a huge debt in demoralization."

"The duration of trouble has actually stimulated Girl Scouting. In the two years preceding the depression the gain in membership was about 37,000. In the next two years it increased by more than 70,000, to a total of nearly 300,000. The Scouts are especially gratified at their representation on the national citizens' committee for welfare and relief mobilization appointed by President Hoover and headed by Newton D. Baker. They welcome the opportunity to extend their social service and to meet hard work with redoubled effort."

Widow of Harriman Dies at Age of 81

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Mrs. Averell Harriman, 81, widow of E. H. Harriman, and at one time called "the richest woman in the world," died here last night. She underwent an emergency operation three days ago.

Mrs. Harriman was known for her business sagacity and assumed direction of the \$100,000,000 railroad estate left her by her husband in 1909. She won a reputation for conservative policies, insisting on 5 per cent investments, whereas her husband had a fondness for more speculative investments.

U. OF O. STUDENTS RATE HIGHER THAN AVERAGE IN TEST

Students in education and psychology at the University of Oregon scored higher than national average in a test on statistics and on background of statistics devised by Dr. T. L. Kelly of Harvard, and one Oregon student, Clifford L. Constance, scored 180 in the statistics test, when the highest grade given in the forms was 163, it was announced Tuesday by Dr. Howard R. Taylor, professor of psychology.

The test on background of statistics had previously been standardized on students of University of Illinois and graduate students of Columbia university, while the statistics test was standardized on graduate students of Columbia and Harvard.

The Oregon students scored above the average in the background test, while in the statistics test only 40 per cent of those taking it in the east made as high an average as that made by the Oregon group.

The tests here were given to members of the psychology class taught by Dr. Taylor and the class in statistics taught by Dr. C. L. Huffaker, professor of education. They were sent on to Dr. Kelly who scored and rated them.

Three issues hot
Fifty thousand more voters were registered for this election in Oregon than in 1928, the previous high mark. The total of all parties this year was 486,146, against 436,180 in 1928 when only 319,942 persons actually cast ballots.

The presidential race, the battle for congressional seats and the school consolidation bill were the source of the keenest interest to the Oregon electorate. But little enthusiasm for or antagonism against the bill to repeal the enforcing statute of the state prohibition law was heard during the campaign.

BOSTON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—With 37 of Massachusetts' 1007 precincts reported, including 34 out of 45 in the city of New Bedford, Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic president nominee had a lead over President Hoover of 3481. Totals were: Hoover 9305; Roosevelt 13,146.

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Incomplete returns from Vice-President Charles Curtis' home precinct gave the President Hoover and his Kansas running mate an early lead of nearly three to one. The vote: Hoover 101; Roosevelt 37.

BOSTON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Returns from 21 precincts out of 1707 in Massachusetts, including 19 in the city of New Bedford, gave Franklin D. Roosevelt a lead of 178 votes early this afternoon. The totals were: Hoover 5240; Roosevelt 5418.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Twenty-seven incomplete precincts in four cities of Oklahoma shortly after noon today gave for president: Roosevelt 1590; Hoover 968. Twenty-four of the precincts were in Oklahoma City and one each in Tulsa, Muskogee and Vinita.

PAPILLION, Neb., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Incomplete returns from one Sarpy

county precinct today gave Roosevelt 40 votes out of 44 cast.

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Incomplete returns from 24 city precincts here gave: For president—Hoover 1326; Roosevelt 882.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Unofficial tabulations today gave Hoover 1520 and Roosevelt 1753 in Springfield and Greene county.

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Scattered, partial returns from eight cities in Kansas gave: Roosevelt 3,350; Hoover 3,290.

The reported precincts were in Kansas City, Kas., Topeka, Coffeyville, Paola, Salina, Fort Scott, Parsons and Pittsburg.

EL PASO, TEXAS, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Thirteen incomplete precincts of 51 in El Paso county gave for president: Roosevelt 521; Hoover 88.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Scattered incomplete returns from four Missouri cities gave Roosevelt 4,000; Hoover, 3,390. The unofficial returns were from Springfield, Hopkin, Jefferson City and Marshall.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Incomplete returns from 52 precincts in five cities of Oklahoma late today gave Roosevelt 2908; Hoover 2140. Forty-three of the precincts were in Oklahoma City; six in Tulsa, and one each in Wewoka, Vinita and Muskogee. President Hoover carried the state in 1928.

DETROIT, Nov. 8.—(AP)—First returns from today's election, one precinct complete in Pointe Aux Barques, Huron county, gave Hoover 6, Roosevelt 14.

Four years ago the precinct voted republican 12; democratic 4.
