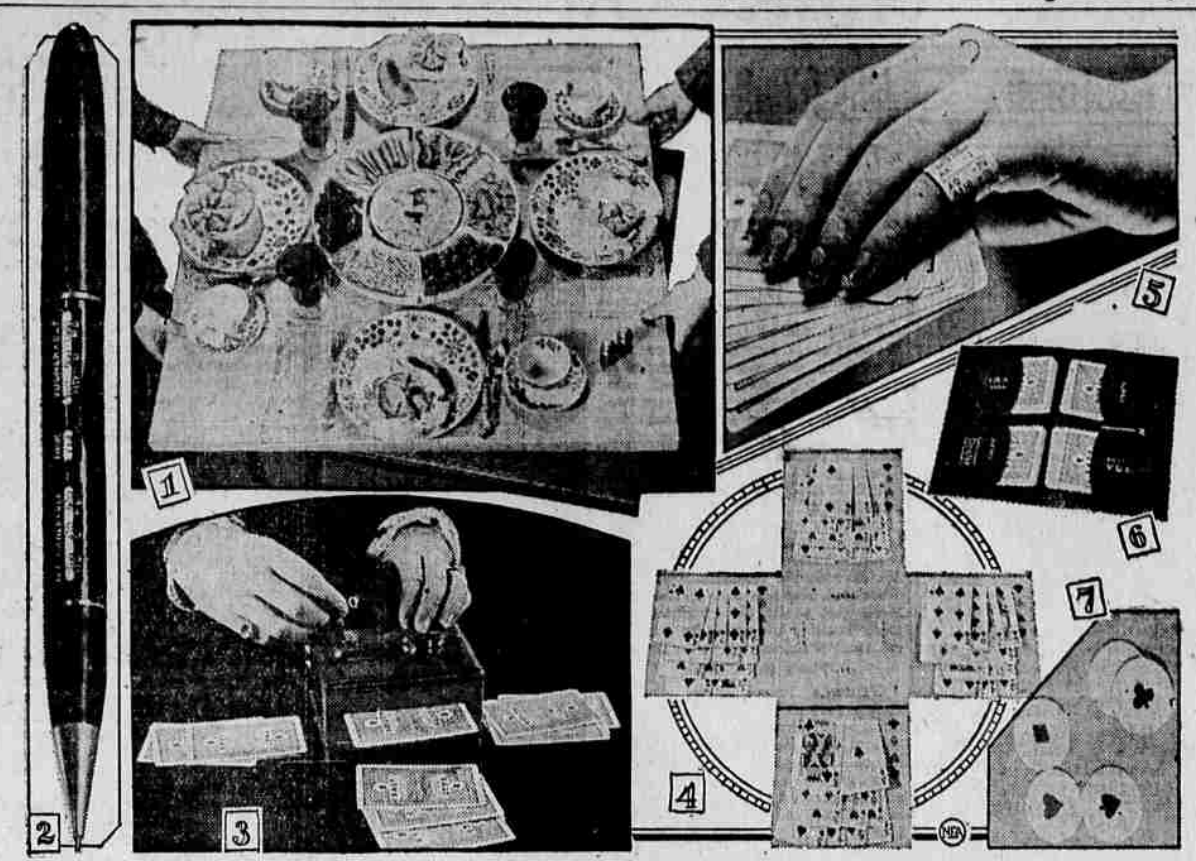

YOUR CHILDREN

A WELFARE worker told me recently that one of the worst phases in this depression is the doubling up of families, reduced space to play in, too many people thrown into close quarters, and the hopeless confusion of living.
"It is having a noticeable effect on the behavior of children," she said, "because good behavior has its foundation in decent living and enough room to keep up self respect."
When conditions improve, this congestion naturally will be relieved. Let us hope it will be soon. But no matter how prosperous we may become, there are numerous families who do not consider roomy quarters in the light of an asset in raising their young.

Many at Fault
It is not always the poor or the indigent family who saves on space. There were, during our recent years of prosperity, any number of parents who lived in small apartments or houses who could well have afforded more room.

The automobile is partly responsible, as we know. Anything to keep a car? Cut down on rent, do without food, double up, triple or quadruple up, cut down on butter and milk so a car can stand at the curbstone!

However, this is no arraignment against cars or anything else. I am merely urging the wise parent to consider the element of privacy and order in bringing up children.

I know families, plenty of them, who keep a guest room and make the children sleep double or even three in a room. One I recall at the moment has, in addition, a room set off for storage and another for a maid.

The house seems to be full of rooms and yet a 6-year-old girl and her 14-year-old half-sister room together. Now this is all right, except that it could be much better. They might get a maid who prefers to go home at night, or else clear out the big store room, or at least use the guest room part of the time when Grandma or Uncle Frank is not there.

Pride of Possession
A child of any age loves the privacy, peace and ownership of his own retreat. A place in which his own individuality rules supreme.

It may be only a cubby-hole, but the bigger and sunnier, the better, of course. Children should have the brightest, best rooms in any house, at least when they are young. They should have their own things in their rooms, and they should be fixed up as far as possible the way their small masters or mistresses prefer. Inexpensive chintz or cretonne will make a paradise of any child's room. Home made shelves for toys or books, a painted floor of any color, low bookshelves in the closet, a low table and chair.

When times get better I hope there will be a general exodus out of families to houses with enough room, and yards with enough space to give the children a chance to live and grow up in normal surroundings.

TODAY'S RECIPES

SOMETIMES it seems that when we attempt to economize on meat by using the cheaper cuts we must spend so much for gas or current that no real saving is effected—the money saved on the meat must be spent for fuel to cook it.

Did you ever try chopping the tougher cuts of meat? Chopped meat cleverly handled may be cooked quite as quickly as the more expensive chops and steaks. Beef, veal, lamb and pork can be chopped and used in many appetizing ways.

To make veal patties, shape chopped veal into small flat cakes and bind each cake with a strip of bacon. Braise over the fire or bake in a hot oven for 40 minutes. Since it takes two or three hours to cook a stew, a worth-while saving in fuel is accomplished.

Lamb and beef can be made into these same patties and cooked the same way, or broiled. These meats are particularly good broiled, and broiling requires even less time than the other methods.

Combined with a casserole or bread crumbs, chopped meat makes excellent meat loaves with the crumbs acting as an "extender." Careful seasoning makes these loaves savory and a little meat goes a long way. Forty-five minutes to an hour is needed to bake these loaves.

Chopped meat and cereal used together make nourishing dishes, too. Rice or macaroni can be used in a number of ways with chopped meat and vegetables, or with the meat alone. Potatoes need not be included in the menu when a combination of this sort is served.

Tamale Pie
One pound lean meat, 1 cup cornmeal, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 onion, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1 cup canned pineapple, 3-4 c. chili powder.
Make a mush of the cornmeal and three to four cups of boiling water, adding 1 teaspoon salt to water. Let cook about half an hour. Put meat, though food chopper with onion. Cook in a hot, lightly oiled frying pan until the raw color of the meat disappears. Stir with a fork in order to insure uniform cooking. Add canned tomatoes, pimientos, remaining salt and chili powder and bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Line a well-buttered baking dish with about three-fourths of the mush, saving just enough to cover the top. Fill with meat and tomato mixture and cover with remaining mush. Bake 30 minutes in a hot oven. Serve from baking dish.
