

COAST LUMBERMEN CONTINUE GROUP

TACOMA, Nov. 10. — (AP) — The West Coast Lumbermen's association will continue in operation.

Stockholders, meeting here today at the Winthrop hotel, voted that the organization should continue, since 84.5 per cent of the members had pledged to support the association's activities.

Last night it was agreed that unless 80 per cent signed up the association would disband.

The association, with hopes of cutting railroad freight rates on lumber from western states to Chicago, expected to authorize Col. W. R. Greeley, secretary-manager, to investigate feasibility of shipping lumber by sea through the Panama canal up the Mississippi river, and establishing terminals to handle products.

Seventy-five stockholders present passed such a resolution, which no doubt will be approved by the trustees.

A committee reported that to forestall any slump in the market, each manufacturer should put employees on a 36-hour-a-week basis and that no more lumber should be manufactured in excess of orders.

J. D. Tennant, Longview, president of the association, presided.

Winners Give Thanks

Here is Young's statement:
"I want to express my appreciation to the people of Lane county for the splendid vote which I received at the recent election. I desire to assure the people that I will undertake the duties of the office of county commissioner with full appreciation of the responsibilities of that office, and I will endeavor to perform the duties of the office to the end that the county government be efficiently conducted and that taxes be reduced in every way possible."

Vera Todd Crow, defeated candidate for the county school office, thanked the voters also, and added that her campaign for increased efficiency is not yet over.

Edward P. Bailey, democratic leader, expressed satisfaction at the election result.

Marion Vetch, defeated candidate for coroner, made this statement:

"I want to thank my friends who supported me so loyally for the office which I sought.

"With many others who were unsuccessful, I will accept my defeat gracefully and bespeak success for my opponent and all others who won."

play the principles he expounded during the campaign.

The democratic grip on the new congress did not extend to winning control of the senate for the immediate short session. A sudden upturn in the late vote counting on the part of republican Senator W. Warren

Barbour of New Jersey brought him safely past his democratic opponent, Perry H. Stewart, to whom at one time he had conceded defeat. The seat is to be occupied this session, just as is the one in Colorado where republican Karl C. Schuyler won.

His victory gave the republicans 48 seats to the remainder of the old congress, to 47 democrats and one farmer-labor.

G. O. P. Governors Lose
But so many fell in the election for next term that republican ranks were thinned and decimated, with nearly all of the "old guard" leaders ousted. With but two dozen house races in doubt, the present republican strength of the house had been slashed by one hundred, giving the democrats the certainty of more than 300 votes.

The governor's races told much the same tale. Including four seats not at stake in this year's elections, the G. O. P. held but nine governor's chairs, definitely, with a slight chance in one or two states more.

With the democratic sweep of congress appeared to have come such anti-prohibition majorities that the hope of immediate legalization of beer, held by ardent wets, climbed high, and several key men in congress hastened to add their voices to those who have already spoken for accomplishing this modification of the Volstead act during the winter.

Hoover Tried Man
With this hope, up went expectations of early submission to the states of the 18th amendment repeal—which like modification was demanded by the democratic platform and called for in the campaign by Roosevelt.

The minorities for prohibition change were calculated on the basis of polls by anti-dry organizations which indicated that a minimum of 47 senators in the new congress would support repeal or resubmission while in the house some 300 were so recorded.

While the country's political thoughts and talk dealt almost exclusively with the winner, at Palo Alto, California, rested "the firebrand man in America." So his aides described President Hoover, who had conceded defeat and congratulated his successor-to-be, less than half a day after completing an extraordinary cross-country campaign, in search of the vote of confidence that was denied him.

Socialists Count Gains
His plans still were uncertain, his mind divided between taking a recuperative trip through the Panama canal, and making a quick dash back to the career which have weighed him down during the critical past years.

Socialists were counting on the total of their candidate, Norman Thomas, who termed his own defeat a victory. Scant third of the country heard from his popular vote was nearing 400,000, with a strong possibility he would pass the record set for his party by Eugene Debs, in 1920, with 920,000.

The election hardly over, the bitterness and hard words of the campaign were being rapidly forgotten, covered under assurances by the losers that there would be no obstruction of any sound democratic program.

Benton Only County To Go For Hoover

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10. — (AP) — Benton county, alone of the 36 in Oregon, returned a majority of votes for President Hoover. The other 35 preferred Gov. Roosevelt.

Complete figures received by the Associated Press from Benton county give Hoover 4073 votes, and Roosevelt 3121.

Similarly, Union county was the only one to vote a preference for Walter Gleason over Senator Stewart. The vote was: Gleason 2012; Stewart 3004.

Oregon Experiences Fall Cold "Snap"

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10. — (AP) — A real cold "snap" was experienced by Oregon today with near and sub-freezing temperatures forecast for tonight.

The first heavy frost of the season whitened the countryside around here although the weather bureau reported an "official" minimum temperature of only 38 degrees.

Sub-freezing temperatures were reported from eastern Oregon: Bend, 20; Baker, 24; and Umatilla, 27.

The minimum temperature in Eugene Wednesday night was 32 degrees. Light frost appeared.

John Galsworthy Is Nobel Prize Winner

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 10. — (AP) — The 1932 Nobel prize for literature was bestowed today upon John Galsworthy, the British novelist and dramatist.

The author of "The Forsyte Saga" had been mentioned in newspaper predictions as the probable recipient of the award.

Last year's prize, worth about \$31,000, was won by Erik A. Karlfeldt, of Sweden. Sinclair Lewis, who received the prize in 1930, was the first American to be so honored.

Robbery Suspect Stopped By Police

J. B. Denning, suspected by state police of having robbed a postoffice in Indiana, was being held here Thursday afternoon pending investigation.

He was arrested for stealing a ride on a freight train and a further check led officers to hold him for Indiana authorities. His case will be investigated further Friday.

TANKER IS DAMAGED

ATLANTIC SEABOARD POUNDED BY STORM

The Atlantic seaboard was pounded by a terrific gale that damaged scores of ocean front communities and imperilled small vessels. Two persons were killed.

Eastern Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, and Long Island were whipped by the gale which extended as far north as Massachusetts, where high tides and a strong wind were reported.

The Bahamas Islands apparently escaped damage from the hurricane, although damage in Cuba was high. The barometer at Nassau was rising and the wind had diminished to 30 miles an hour.

The storm was believed part of the low pressure area caused by a hurricane which struck Cuba and today was moving northeastward, about 250 miles east southeast of Nassau, Bahamas Islands. At least 18 were killed in Cuba.

While in the east, storm clouds were clearing, the midwest saw its first extensive snowstorm of the year. High drifts in Minnesota and the Dakotas delayed collection of election returns. Chicago had its first snow. Snowfall ranging from blizzard intensity to mild flurries was general from central Indiana and Illinois to the akota prairies.

seats, which was the record republican power in 1920.

The most the democrats ever gained before was 290 in the Wilson victory of 1912.

Only twice in history has any party held more than 50 seats in the senate. The republicans held that many in 1868 and again after the off year elections in 1906.

The coming short session of congress also will have a record of its own—in the number of "lame duck" members, those holding offices that terminate March 4.

Primary defections, resignations and the elections have produced 14 "lame ducks" in the house and 14 in the senate, far more than ever before.

300 Said Killed In Big Hurricane

HAVANA, Nov. 10. — (AP) — The correspondent at Matanzas for the newspaper Information telephoned today that 300 persons had been killed at Camaguey City in yesterday's hurricane.

This number was many times greater than other estimates of the casualties and the information could not be confirmed because the wires to Camaguey were down.

The correspondent said he had been to Camaguey and the destruction there was terrific. He was unable to estimate the number of injured.

Disappearance of Pastor Investigated

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Nov. 10. — (AP) — A threat of death against the Rev. Sigismund Luky, for seven years pastor of the Hungarian Evangelical Reformed church here, was being investigated today following the minister's disappearance from home late yesterday.

Rev. Luky left home while his wife was asleep. No action was taken until he failed to appear at a meeting of the Mahoning Presbytery last night, when police were informed.

and Senator Charles L. McNary will occupy seats in the upper department. Congressman Charles H. Martin, re-elected; Walter M. Pierce, who defeated the republican representative, Robert R. Butler, and James W. Mott, republican, will go to the lower house.

By about the same majority which Oregon voters gave to Roosevelt, the state prohibition law was repealed, leaving only the federal statutes and a few city laws for enforcement. The vote, with 1469 precincts accounted for was 160,032 for repeal, and 102,548 against repeal.

The proposed measure to consolidate the University of Oregon and Oregon State college was completely snowed under by a blizzard of ballots after a campaign which was probably as bitterly fought throughout the state as any in any recent election. The measure called for physical consolidation of the two institutions on the Corvallis campus.

The measure to tax butter substitutes to the advantage of dairymen was decisively defeated, as was another which would have limited loads and increased taxation on commercial truck operators.

By a majority of about 25,000 the voters approved a constitutional amendment proposing the creation of a commission of three non-partisan elected members to incur indebtedness up to 6 per cent of assessed valuation for developing hydro-electric projects.

A measure which would have advanced income tax rates on net incomes in excess of \$5000 was defeated.

Joseph K. Carson, Jr., young democrat, who for several years has been prominent in the city, was elected mayor of Portland to succeed George L. Baker, retired.

All major state officials whose terms expired were returned to office. All are republicans.

Justice Bean won easily over Roy Hewitt of Salem. Justice Bailey was unopposed for the No. 3 position.

18TH AMENDMENT VOTE TO BE ASKED

BEND, Ore., Nov. 10. — (AP) — Jay H. Upton, central Oregon senator, will seek at the 1933 legislative session to have machinery set up to enable Oregon to vote on repeal of the 18th amendment, he announced here today. Upton favors a convention, rather than action by the legislature, on a resubmission of the prohibition question.

Upton will ask that the governor call a special session to name delegates to such a convention. At the same time, he holds, the question of revision of Oregon's constitutional provisions on liquor could be submitted to the voters without extra cost. He pointed out that the repeal vote Tuesday created a difficult and unusual situation, with constitutional prohibition, but no law to enforce it.

George Scott Chosen Mayor of Harrisburg

HARRISBURG, Nov. 10. — (Special) — In the town election here George Scott was elected mayor over Clarence Githens. W. E. Wadsworth was elected recorder by three votes more than his opponent, C. O. Fry. There was no treasurer candidate on the ticket but the name of Nona Hoyt was written in by a large number of voters.

The choice for marshal is still to be made, there being a tie between John Kelsey and John Owen. The other candidates for the office are far behind. The new council will be John Cramer, Robert Stroda, C. Gilbert, A. J. Jacobs, Willard and H. T. Widdfield.
