

BOOK WEEK WILL BE OBSERVED IN M. AND W. STORE

Plans and the program for observance of annual book week, Nov. 14-19, have been announced from the book department of the McMorran and Washburne store.

A book contest will feature the annual observance. The contest will be held for three groups, junior high school students, senior high school students, and adults. A book is to be given as the prize for each group. Books will be selected with which all contestants are familiar. The title will be jumbled up such as "Ewaw-diwetadn" by "Aeripuckb," which when put together correctly reads "East Wind, West Wind," by Pearl Buck.

Ten titles for each division will appear daily. The answers must be in to the book department at McMorran and Washburne store by 5 p. m. the following day.

BEER FIGHT STORY

Fray, superintendent of state police, who has confined his activities the past few days to a thorough analysis of the statutes and in conferences with legal authorities.

One of the chief conclusions reached today was that there is nothing unlawful in the possession of intoxicating liquors in Oregon except for the purpose of sale, and that private transportation of intoxicants, except for sale, is likewise legal.

Police Have Orders

Hereafter, Fray announced, state police will confine their enforcement activities to arrest for driving while intoxicated, drunkenness and the manufacture of intoxicants. If it is decided that they shall become aides of the federal officers in enforcing the Volstead act their duties will be extended to arrests for possession for sale and transportation for sale. Repeal of the Anderson act likewise has made many of the remaining provisions of the state statutes inoperative. It was pointed out by Fray and John Carson, district attorney of Marion county, inasmuch as most of them were dependent upon the Anderson act to make their violations unlawful and punishable.

In this category fall the statutes regarding the transportation of liquor, and of possession of intoxicants while armed, both of which are enforceable when such transportation or possession is "unlawful," and the only thing that made them "unlawful" was section 15-105 of the Anderson act, now repealed.

Sale Point Point

The officers said that transportation is now punishable only where the transportation is for purpose of sale. Authority for search of persons, homes and private vehicles for liquor no longer exists, and search warrants can not be issued except upon evidence of sale, the authorities agreed.

With the possession of the finished product now legalized by federal and state laws, the officials were also doubtful of the validity of the state statute making beer and wine in the process of manufacture a felony. The manufacture of whiskey and other distilled liquors is still a violation of two state laws, one prohibiting such manufacture and the other prohibiting the possession of an unregistered still.

The statutes against drunkenness, giving or furnishing liquor of any sort to minors, and drinking in public places are still in force.

state by a majority of more than 77,000.

Only a few minor precincts in southeastern and southwestern Oregon had yet to be tallied. They contained a mere handful of ballots.

However, while the Oregon voters were giving this tremendous majority to the democratic candidate for president, Senator Frederick Steiwer, republican incumbent, was rolling up a 50,000 lead over his democratic opponent, Walter B. Gleason.

James W. Mott built up a lead of more than 22,000 over his democratic opponent, Harvey Starkweather, for congressman from the first district; General Charles H. Martin, Portland democrat, was easily re-elected from the third district, and Walter Pierce of La Grande, ex-governor, won by a majority of more than 4,000 votes over Congressman Robert R. Butler of The Dalles.

ing some serious thought to this question Friday, but were unable to announce any definite policy to be put into effect immediately.

Eugene V. Slattery, deputy district attorney, is studying laws regarding the initiative law, by which the people voted wet, and laws regarding the possession and sale of liquor. He and District Attorney Alta King said they could give no opinion until further study is made. State police said they could form no policy until orders are received from Salem.

Tomlinson Thursday refused to issue a search warrant for an address where liquor was believed to be stored. Possession of liquor is no longer a crime in Oregon, the judge observed.

come law until the secretary of state has canvassed the vote and certified it to the governor and until the governor has proclaimed the law has carried. This procedure must take place within 30 days after the election.

Press reports have placed a state police officer and the attorney general on record as stating that the law was in effect as soon as the polls closed. Possibly the supreme court has declared the old statute on the initiative unconstitutional or placed some other interpretation on it.

Slattery said, however, that in any case the old local option laws will not be in force. The Anderson act repealed them.

Beyond keeping order in the city, the Eugene police force will not be concerned in liquor cases in the fu-

ture, it is expected here following the repeal of the state bone dry law.

City officials have thus far taken no action in the matter nor have they discussed it together. City Attorney S. M. Calkins, while not prepared to give an official opinion Friday, stated that in his opinion city police would merely interest themselves in cases of "drunk and disorderly," in regard to liquor law enforcement.

Such charter provisions as Eugene has in liquor cases are now obsolete, Mr. Calkins explained, and it is expected that the city council will line up with the state in regard to prohibition enforcement. The city has an ordinance which corresponded to the state Anderson law, but Calkins said in all likelihood the council would consider it repealed along with the state law.
