

FOUR NEW SCOUT TROOPS FORMED BY EUGENE CHURCHES

Four new scout troops are being organized in Eugene as part of the local participation in the Ten-Year scout plan which aims to make every fourth boy in the nation a scout-trained man. It was announced Saturday by G. D. McLaren, chairman of troop organization of the Wallamet scout council.

These four troops are being organized in Eugene to accommodate boys of scout age who are not already enrolled in scout troops. Several petitions for troops in country districts have been received and as soon as the work is underway in the city, troops will be organized in the country.

"As a result of the survey con-

ducted to find out how many boys of scout age are not in troops, it was found there were enough here to fill eight troops," Mr. McLaren said. "However, we are at present starting only four troops and more will be organized if these will not accommodate all the boys who wish to join."

The Fairmount Presbyterian church, the Fairmount Christian church, the Bethany Evangelical and the St. Mary's Catholic church are sponsoring the four troops now being formed. Only one troop committee has been appointed so far, that of the Fairmount Presbyterian church consisting of Elmer Surdam, J. W. McArthur and Madison Landaker.

As soon as plans are completed for the organization in the other

troops, committees will be appointed and the work got under way, McLaren said.

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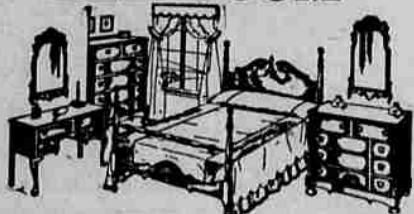
