

CITY FATHERS FILE FIRST APPLICATION FOR BEER PERMIT

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID
RECEIVED application for a license to sell beer.
PASSED ordinance on connecting outside houses to city sewers.
HEARD reports on condemnation proceedings.
ALLOWED regular monthly bills.
SETTLED two accident claims.
REFERRED petition for alley light to fire and water committee.

The first application for a license to sell beer and malt beverages in the city of Eugene was received by the city council at its meeting Monday night. The application, submitted by James Reay and asking for whatever form of license might be available, was filed away by the city council.

No action could be taken on the matter as yet as the status of the prohibition law in this state is still somewhat obscure, members of the council decided.

A report on condemnation proceedings on a building at 1432 Villard street, declared to be a menace, was heard and along with it representatives of the owner declared the building would be made safe immediately. However, in order to eliminate the possibility of having to go over the ground again, the council ordered its removal in case it was not made safe within 20 days.

Reports on two other buildings were given by Councilman Zumwalt, one at the corner of Third and Lincoln streets and one at Twenty-First and Villard. Both were declared nuisances and the matter was referred to the city attorney to prepare condemnation papers.

Monthly bills were allowed and a report on the completion of an up-to-date filing system in the fire department made by George Stokes, deputy state fire marshal was heard. The city recorder was instructed to convey the thanks of the city to the state fire marshal for this work.

Two accident claims were settled by the council for the amount of the medical attention involved. In the case of the claim of Thomas Hartfield the claim was settled for \$230.40. The claim of Grace Robertson was settled for \$38. The claims resulted from accidents on city streets. An application to sell insurance to the city against accidents resulting from defective streets was received from the Sigmund-Fell company and referred to the judiciary committee.

Two petitions were heard. One sought an alley light in the center of the block of Charnelton, Lincoln, Eighth and Broadway and it was referred to the fire and water committee. The other sought vacation of the east 22 feet of Rainey street and this was referred back for completion of the petition.

The council passed an ordinance providing for the connection of property outside the city limits to the city sewer system and accepted a deed from Marius Anderson for sewer right-of-way.

Reports of the building inspector and the police matron were heard and approved.

do our work and the county will have to foot the bill.

"A case similar to this came up in Curry county not long ago. The state was holding an election, but Curry county had no funds, and decided not to hold the election in that county.

The state directed the county to hold one, and the county had to pay the bill.

"We county officials in the various departments are under bond, and we must see to it that we have adequate facilities to do the job. Members of the county court are not required to put up a bond, yet they spend a big share of the county's money."

County Pays Anyway
So if the court should cut some deputies out of the clerk's office, it appears that they might be hired back and the work charged to the county anyway.

Reduction of salaries would not apply to the salaries received by the county officials elected by the people. Mr. Slattery pointed out in his opinion. These salaries are set by statute, and can be changed only by the legislature. In many counties of the state salaries of deputies and assistants have likewise been set by the legislature. In Lane county, however this is not the general rule.

—and with the exception of an assistant in the treasurer's office, a deputy coroner and a deputy assessor—the county court is empowered by statute to go into the of-

fices and make changes.

The budget committee announced Tuesday that the impending battle over the county agricultural agent's office will be made a special order of business at 2 p. m. Friday. Before this, the home demonstration agent's office will be a special order of business at 10 a. m. The fair board will meet with the committee Thursday.

Representatives of the Eugene Fruit Growers association, the agricultural division of the chamber of commerce and the county agricultural council will appear to defend the agricultural agent's office.

Swartz Offers Saving
The budget committee spent Tuesday conferring with county officials and receiving their budget applications.

C. A. "Tom" Swartz, sheriff-elect, presented a request for \$28,740 to carry on his office for the year. This is a reduction of \$4,460 from last year and Swartz said the saving would be made by keeping salaries at their present low level, reducing some salaries and cutting operating expenses wherever possible.

Ben Keeney put in a request for \$14,000, a reduction of \$1,000, for

the county assessor's office.

W. B. Dillard, county clerk, reduced his budget \$2,800 by enforcing a five day week on his employees. His budget calls for \$18,000.

County Treasurer Grace Schiska asked for an increase. She applied for \$4,200. Last year the figure was \$3,965. This increase was made necessary by increased prices of surety bonds, she said.

Assistant Supt. Out
P. M. Morse put in for \$8,800, a reduction of \$150 on paper, but in reality a reduction of \$1,800, as the salary of the surveyor will be taken from the general fund of the budget rather than the market road fund, as it was last year. The county will pay the same, but a reduction is realized in the office item.

Last year the school and club agent's offices turned in their account together and this year are making separate budgets. They have effected a saving by cutting out the position of assistant county school superintendent (lopping off \$1800 there). The school budget this year is \$4,732 and the club request \$1,972.

The health unit compiled a report of its year's activities and presented

it to the committee as an offer of proof that its budget should be retained as it is.

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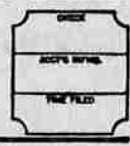
