

LANE COUNTY BOY EXHIBITS AT SHOW

Ten ears of Yellow Dent corn grown by Carson Adams, four-H club boy of the Norton district, were shipped Friday by R. C. Kuehner, county four-H leader, to the National Club congress in Chicago to compete with corn displays from all parts of the country.

Carson sent an exhibit of his corn to this show last year and received tenth award. The specimens sent this year are said to be much better than those of last year.

This club member won second on his 100-ear display at the Pacific International Land Products show in connection with the livestock exposition in Portland this fall. He competed with exhibitors from all counties north of Douglas in Oregon and west of the Cascade mountains, both in Oregon and Washington. He also placed first in the 25-ear exhibit in the Union Stockyards class, which covered all counties in western Oregon, and besides won the reserve championship of Oregon, Washington and Idaho in the last named class.

This year Carson raised two acres of corn and it yielded 72 bushels to the acre.

Mr. Whitesmith will open the afternoon session with "Cooperative Possibilities in Lane County."

federal government is concerned," Roosevelt said.

"I have no federal authority. I am just a private citizen."

Weissman then asked that armories in Amsterdam, Newburgh and New York City be opened to the marchers, that they be supplied with blankets, food, shelter, and free transportation in state trucks to Washington.

"The state has no authority to grant the use of armories for meetings," Roosevelt explained. "They can only be used for housing purposes when the mayor of the city in which they are located certifies to the governor that other housing facilities are insufficient."

Dr. Guldager Wins In Big Damage Suit

A verdict for the defendant was returned by a jury in the circuit court Friday afternoon in the case of Lillian Van Loan against Dr. George Guldager, a Eugene physician. This is a case wherein the plaintiff sued the defendant for \$25,000 general damages and \$15,000 punitive damages, alleging malpractice in an obstetrical case. The jury retired about 11 a. m. and returned its verdict shortly after 1 o'clock.
