Escaped Prisoner Is Killer Suspect

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 19.—(AP)—The theory that Canerio Pineda, 40, escaped California road camp prisoner, may have been the slayer of Frank Craig, filling station operator, here Wednesday night, was advanced by detectives investigating the killing today.

C. S. Yates told officers after he had seen a picture of Pineda that a man answering the description was seen here in a dark automobile several hours after the killing. a decrease of \$37,455. The remaining items will more than bring the amount to the \$52,800 point. I believe this mark will be exceeded several thousand dollars. Next week we will consider roads and bridges, and I can see a hard week's work ahead."

Sheriff's Office Cut

The budget board cut \$8550 out of the 1932 budget of the sheriff, allowing \$20,850. Deputies' pay all the way through the office was slashed. The highest paid deputy, who used to get \$150 a month, was reduced to \$125.50. Another was cut from \$125 to \$100. Two were cut from \$125 to \$90. The jailer, who formerly received \$100 a month, was cut down to \$75. The chief deputy in the tax department will be given \$112.50. He used to get \$140. Two deputies in this department who formerly got \$125 were granted \$100. A stenographer's salary was reduced from \$90 to \$75. The sheriff asked for \$3000 for extra help, and was allowed \$2500.

Keeney's Budget Hill

County Assessor Ben F. Keeney submitted a budget for 1933 asking for \$13,850. After paring down salaries, the budget was left at \$13,190. This is a reduction of \$1810 from the 1932 budget. Keeney's highest paid deputies applied for \$120 a month, and the board cut them down to \$100 each. Some time ago they were cut to \$117, however. They used to get \$130. A clerk who was paid \$75 will be allowed \$65.

Consideration of the treasurer's budget was not completed. There is only one assistant in that office. The board cut her from \$80 to \$75. The treasurer asked for \$4200, an increase from the 1932 budget of \$3905. The increase was due to the increase in bond prices and the need for more supplies.

Deputy D. A. Cut \$900

The district attorney's budget was reconsidered and finally an allowance of \$9420 was made, a saving of \$1200 from 1932. The deputy district attorney's salary was set at \$1500 a year. The deputy formerly received \$2400.

Monday the board will go through the rest of the offices, applying the knife. Then it will come to the road budget. It is planned to take a day off before considering the roads, in order to give members an opportunity to study the problem and visit some of the roads.

"In the first place, I'm not going to Baton Rouge, and in the second place I see no reason for all these reports. Callison has been seriously handicapped during the past few weeks and is at present working with the smallest staff of assistants of any coast conference member."

Reaffirmation of faith in Callison and his players came from Lynn McCready, alumni member on the executive council.

Record Is Better

"I think it's up to all of us, students and alumni as well, to not only stick with the team and coach, but actively show our enthusiasm and loyalty during the next few days," he said. "The team has done better this year than it did last year under Dr. Clarence W. Spears. It seems to me Callison really accomplished something when his team beat Oregon State. But the Los Angeles newspapers expected too much of Oregon and when the team didn't deliver, they came out with a bitter attack. That is no reason for our own members to turn against the team that got beaten

only 38 to 0 this year as compared to the 52 to 0 score last season."

Dissension Ended

Most important of all the expressions of confidence, however, came from the players themselves. There is truth to the reports that there was some internal strife following the Trojan debacle but that is now absent from the squad.

"We're going down there to beat St. Mary's," said each of the players interviewed Saturday. "Prink has had a lot of tough luck this season and we're not going to let him down. Those Southern California press notices were hard to take, but we can go back to California, next week and maybe jam some of them down their throats."

Out of the flurry of gossip and rumors, one fact stands out, however—Oregon's coaching staff will be strengthened before next season. At the present writing, Callison has but two assistants, Gen. Shields and Johnny Kitzmiller. Most conference members have from six to ten. It is not likely Callison will have to face next season short handed.

Reinhardt Scouting
