

### OBJECTIVE CASE TEXT BOOK WILL BE WRITTEN HERE

An objective case book, to be used with the state text on character education, will be compiled by a special committee, appointed by the State High School Principals' association, it is announced here. The committee will work with Dr. J. R. Jewell, dean and director of education for the state board of higher education, who with R. C. Blacker, principal of Richmond school in Portland was author of the manual now in use throughout the state.

The committee of the principals association consists of Harry Johnson, Eugene high school; R. U. Moore, University high school, and W. E. Buel, superintendent of schools and principal of the high school at Springfield.

The text now in use, prepared two years ago under the direction of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, has won wide acclaim nationally, and is regarded as one of the best and at the same time one of the most simple of any used in the entire country. The work of the committee will be a supplement of this, and will provide teachers with additional material with which to illustrate objectives.

The Oregon text was prepared after a thorough study of character manuals in all other states. It is so arranged that it can be used for all grades progressively. An example of this is shown in the listing of trait objectives. For the primary grades such traits as obedience, truthfulness, punctuality are listed. These become respectively conformity, honesty and sincerity in the second group for more advanced grades, and for the higher grades are co-operation, sincerity and reliability.

The text contains an outline of the general problem, psychological principles involved, character objectives, character trait objectives, and measurement of progress and attainment as main topics, each of which has subdivisions.

The manual is now in use as a text for courses in education in two large eastern institutions, and has been approved by the Association of Denominational colleges of the Mississippi valley. Three prominent publishing houses have also shown an interest in publishing it nationally, it is stated.

### RELIEF PLAN FOR COUNTY OUTLINED BY COOPERATIVE

Recommendation that steps be taken in Eugene to establish a co-operative exchange, a co-operatively operated cannery, a co-operatively run woolen mill and sawmill as a means of effecting relief in Lane county was made at the conference of the Community Cooperative league at the Community Liberal church, Saturday. A committee has been named to look into the matter. The recommendation followed an address by Rev. Ernest M. Whitesmith on the problems of Lane county.

Thirty-six persons, representing this section from the coast to Bend, attended the meeting. The Red Cross, the Roman Catholic church through Rev. Francis P. Leipzig, the Congregational church through Rev. Clay E. Palmer, the Unitarian church through Rev. Mr. Whitesmith, and other organizations were represented.

The meeting was sponsored through the Community Cooperative Alliance, the Cooperative Farm, the University of Oregon sociology department, the Community Liberal church, and other agencies.

Dr. Isaiah Dumas of Boston was one of the principal speakers, detailing the limitations of present political action and cooperative enterprise, and discussing the unification of enterprise as the solution to the problem.

Also Bristol of the Cooperative farm discussed the achievements and limitations of such a farm.


Dr. Samuel Johnson, representing the University of Oregon department of sociology, discussed the reliable sociological information needed. Following the dinner, Rev. Mr. Whitesmith gave his talk in the afternoon. Another conference is called for December 3 at 1:30 p. m., at the Community Liberal church. At that time various committees named will give their reports on the work being done by the cooperative group.

### T. B. Clinic Will Be Conducted Soon

An early diagnosis clinic will be conducted by Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital at Salem, December 15. It is announced here. The Lane County Medical association is co-operating with the public health unit in carrying out this health measure.

Physicians from the entire county are being invited to submit any cases upon which they desire to consult Dr. Bellinger and arrangements should be made through the Stars.


