giving us credit for ability in the art of persuasion that we do not possess," he said.

**Asks Patience**  
The Japanese delegate claimed Japan acted in self defense in Manchuria and referred to the precedent set by American expeditions into Mexico in 1916 and 1917 when Mexico was unable to protect United States interests.

He suggested that since the powers outlawed war through the Kellogg pact and other conventions, they might outlaw the anti-foreign boycott, (chief weapon of the Chinese during the Japanese occupation of part of Shanghai) as an instrument of national policy.

Matsunaka asked the council to look at Japan's record in foreign intercourse in contrast with China's. "We ask the council for a little patience," he said. "If the western world will bestow upon us only a fraction of the tolerance they so generously bestowed on China, it will be gratefully received."

"We want war with no nation. We want no more territory. We are not aggressors. We desire deeply and earnestly the welfare of our great neighbors," Matsunaka said.

turned down Monday when they returned to the budget table to ask that salaries of two assistants not be cut. County Assessor Ben F. Keeney asked that one of his assistants be kept at her present salary and County Treasurer Grace Schiska made the same request for her assistant. The treasurer offered to cut an item in her budget for extra help from \$70 to \$50. The board left it at \$70, however.

Salaries of deputy county clerks may be reduced farther than the budget committee Monday made allowance for, as the county clerk stated that he would put his assistants on a five-day week. The budget committee made the reductions on a basis of full time work and left the problem of the five day week up to the clerk.

The chief recording deputy, who formerly received \$150 a month and was later reduced to \$135, will be allowed only \$112.50 a month by action of the budget committee. Another deputy for whom the county clerk asked \$115 a month will be allowed \$100. Two deputies for whom \$108 was asked will be given \$90. Two deputies who were put in at \$100 by the clerk and two others for whom he asked \$85 will be given \$80. Five deputies who were listed at \$90 will be given only \$75. They would receive \$80 under the five-day week plan.

In the afternoon the board was trying to finish consideration of the surveyor's office and the poor fund. The health unit question was put off to a later date. Market roads and bridges will be taken up next, but a recess of a day or two is expected before consideration of the roads item.

**President Lowell Of Harvard Resigns**

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 21.—(AP)—A. Lawrence Lowell, president of Harvard university for 23 years, tendered his resignation today to the fellows of the college and the members of the board of overseers to be effective when his successor has been named.

Both bodies voted to accept the resignation with regret.

from 1885 and a member of the Eugene circle of the W. O. W. Funeral services are to be held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Veatch chapel, Rev. Cecil F. Ris-tow of the Methodist Episcopal church officiating. Burial will be in the old I. O. O. F. cemetery.
