

GAME MEN OPPOSE REMOVAL OF BOUNTY

Branding the removal of the bounty on cougars as a false economy, a directors meeting of the Lane County Protective association Monday added its voice to the storm of protest that has met the action of the state game commission in this matter. The meeting was held at the Osburn hotel, and the principal business was the filing of the protest.

With the low status of the commission's treasury advanced as a reason, the commission announced early this week the abandonment of the bounty on predatory animals. Since that time, many sportsmen and game associations throughout the state have objected to the move, holding that it will result in the wholesale extermination of the deer.

The Lane county association framed a resolution requesting the board to reconsider its decision, and offering three alternatives as a way out. One, that they try a system of deferred payment; two, that the situation be allowed to remain in its present condition; three, that the bounties be reduced somewhat.

Since there are a good number of Lane county citizens whose sole source of income is the bounties they are able to collect on cougars, the removal will put many men on the county in addition to cutting down the supply of deer. Cougars multiply rapidly, and are said to devour at least a deer a week, a condition that will, unless corrected, result in a great shortage of game animals by the time next year's hunting season comes around.

The dividend will be 10 per cent, and will be on commercial deposits only. The dividend of 25 per cent has already been paid on commercial deposits, while two dividends, totaling 30 per cent, have been paid on savings deposits.
