that she has not had time to tell the west about herself and her culture. K. Sugumori declared, in speaking of "The New Japan," "In no eastern country have the elements of the East and West been so harmoniously blended," he continued, describing the extent to which western industrialism has pervaded the life of Japan.

Pfaff on Manchukuo
Roger Pfaff, adviser for the three young men, spent the summer in Manchukuo, and in a short talk at the assembly emphasized that the new Manchukuo government will keep the "open door" open, contrary to many reports and rumors. He pointed to the great increase in Japanese, Chinese, French and English trade with Manchukuo during the past year, and stated that the American trade had decreased only about \$50,000. Depreciated currency of Japan, China, and Great Britain makes their goods much cheaper than American goods, priced in dollars based on the gold standard, he said.
