

PROFESSORS SPEND 44 HOURS WEEKLY AT TEACHING WORK

University professors, at least nine out of ten of them, devote more than 44 hours per week to the business of preparing the modern youth for life, while more than half of them spend better than eight hours per day for the entire seven days of the week. Some 20 per cent, or one out of five, average more than 12 hours per day for six days of the week.

These are facts determined by an accurate survey recently conducted at the University of Oregon by a committee working under the direction of the institutional research committee, and is regarded as a definite answer to the often asked question of how the working time of college educators compares to that of the individual who considers the 44 hour week as standard.

The committee sent out survey questionnaires to faculty members here which asked those questioned to record whatever they did for every half hour of two typical weeks. The answers were not "estimates" but showed actual time spent in instructing classes, correcting examinations, holding conferences with students, doing research, administrative work, and attending to other duties.

The typical week of the average professor showed a total of 58 hours spent in activities definitely in the service of the university. These instructors report that their work requires an average of nine and one half hours a day from Monday to Friday, six hours on Saturday and four and one half hours on Sunday.

The survey showed that actual time spent in classroom teaching and in such activities as conducting quiz sections averaged 13.9 hours per week, which is almost exactly the 14 hour standard set by the board of higher education. On work of purely administrative nature the average is 10.9 hours per week, that of research, 10.9 hours per week in these two fields. If the professors held to the standard 44 hour week they would have but 20 hours left for preparation of teaching material, for student conferences, for grading papers and numerous other duties of modern educators.

Actual time spent in office and committee rooms totals 42.7 per cent of the total, while 20.5 per cent goes to preparation for class, quiz and laboratory work. This latter involves specific reading, study and planning of courses. Of the rest of the time, 8.6 per cent is required for reading papers, conferences with students take 0.3 per cent, thus leaving but 19 per cent for other activities. Keeping abreast of the rapidly expanding fields of knowledge and research activities claim 12.2 per cent, thus leaving less than seven per cent for miscellaneous activities.

The plan of the survey was worked out by a committee consisting of Dr. H. R. Taylor, head of the personal research bureau; Dr. Ralph W. Leighton, executive secretary of the research council; Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of social sciences; Earl M. Pallett, executive secretary of the university; and Clifford L. Constance, assistant registrar.

HEALTH OF SANTA CLARA CHILDREN IS BETTER THIS YEAR

SANTA CLARA, Nov. 28. — (Special). — The health conditions of the school children of the Santa Clara district 12, for the months of September and October of this year are much better than for the same months of a year ago and two years ago as indicated by data from two sources. One is the comparison of the percent of attendance and the other is records of the inspection by the county health nurse.

The percentage of attendance for the two months just past is 98 as compared with 92 for the same months last year and 94.8 percent the year before. Put in other words each teacher has realized four perfect days attendance every week (5 days) for the children in her room.

The health inspection of the individual child by the county health nurse has recently been completed for the year. Twenty-five per cent of the entire school is free from physical defects. Last year 21 per cent were physically sound or four percent less than this year. It is interesting to note that the physical defects for the first four grades are more varied and more numerous than in the upper grades and in high school. Only ten per cent of the first four grades do not have physical defects as compared to 46 per cent of the high school students who enjoy a sound body.

Only 10 of the 189 children attending school at Santa Clara are more than 10 per cent under weight. Eight of them are mouth breathers. Sixty have defective teeth.

Minor Leagues Deserve Help, Says Johnson

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. — (AP). — Walter Johnson today urged major league help for the struggling minors and remarked that if the small leagues 25 years ago had been no more flourishing than they are at present he might have spent his life pitching hay instead of baseball.

The famous old pitcher who fanned 3500 in his long career and led the American league in Walter Johnson strikeouts for 12 seasons, explained that he got his start in a one-horse league out in Idaho that has long since passed out of existence.

"The big leagues," said Johnson, "ought to see that those little leagues keep running."

"I think they will, because they are not dumb enough to let those leagues die out. They know where their ball players come from. I think they will take some steps, perhaps at this winter's meetings of the owners."

Besides keeping the present minor leagues running, said the "Big Train," the majors, all contributing to a pot for the purpose, should sponsor the formation of new minor leagues "just above the school and amateur baseball class."

"The country's full of these big strong kids just looking for the chance to play baseball," he said, "and baseball's got to give it to 'em or it will be in a bad way."

Johnson who was released by Washington at the end of last season after 20 years as its record-breaking smokball pitcher and four years as its manager, has decided to remain in baseball and before long will make a choice of several offers he has had.

Trojans Will Be Formally Named For Rose Classic

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28. — (AP). — The teams being sent to the University of Southern California will be named tomorrow night by the Tournament of Roses association to represent the west in the Rose Bowl football classic Jan. 2, speculation as to who will be the Trojan opponent in the contest had narrowed down today to three and possibly four teams.
