contests and asked that the council consider the matter. Opinion was against such contests and the city attorney was authorized to draft an ordinance prohibiting walkathons and such contests in the city limits.

Mrs. Warren D. Smith and Mrs. C. A. Horton appeared before the council to request that at least \$2000 be retained in the city budget for playground expenses next year. This item had been cut to \$600 and the council advised the petitioners to return at the public budget meeting on Dec. 7.

A request to move Little Deady hall to the west end of the lot at Eighth and Willamette was made by F. L. Chambers, who bought the building. He announced he intended using it for public meetings. The council refused his request on the grounds it would be in violation of the city building code.

A request for a screen to be planted on the west side of the city dump was made by the Rest Haven Memorial park, and the Rest Haven people were given permission to plant trees for the screen.

A resolution condemning a building at 260 Lincoln street was read and Dec. 10 set as the time when the public could be heard on the matter. Requests to condemn two buildings on University street, one in the 2300 block and one in the 2400 block were read and referred to the fire and water committee.

Installation of an alley light in the center of the Charnelton and Lincoln and Eighth and Broadway block was authorized. The street committee reported that red lights had been installed at the ends of Tenth and Mill streets. Councilman Simon was authorized to investigate the necessity for a stop sign at Eleventh and Alder streets.

Under suspended rules, an ordinance providing for the paving of the sidewalk on the east side of Willamette street between Thirteenth

and Fourteenth avenues was given three readings and passed.

The judiciary committee reported adversely on the matter of taking out insurance to cover all accidents happening on city streets.

The matter of obstructions to progress on the street corner of Eighth and Willamette streets, where a sign board is now located, was discussed and the city engineer was authorized to investigate and take any needed measures.

The application of Albert Anderson for the position of building inspector was received and filed. Completed petitions for the vacation of a section of Hamsey street were received and the matter referred to the street committee.

Many Donations Given For Lunches

SPRINGFIELD, Nov. 29. — (Special.)—Appeals for materials to be used by the Parent Teacher association in preparing the hot lunches which it began serving in the grade schools this week have resulted in many donations. It was reported by Glen B. Wood, principal of the Brattain school, Tuesday.

Milk, beans, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, and many other food articles have been sent in by parents to be used in preparing the lunches, which are to be served to all children bringing their lunches to school. Hot soup is to be served four days a week, and on Wednesday hot cocoa is to be made. Since the P. T. A. has no funds for this project, all materials must be donated.

Not only are parents of children who bring their lunches sending in food for the lunches but donations have been received from a number of other people, Mr. Wood reported.
