

HOOK NAMED HEAD OF CHAMBER GROUP FOR NEW MEMBERS

Appointment of E. R. Hook as chairman of the membership committee and an entirely new method of conducting the work of the department were announced Tuesday by E. R. Morris, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce.

"There will be no 'drive' or 'campaign' lasting a few days during which we expect to take into the membership a large number of people," Mr. Morris stated, "but rather a continuous week by week effort to contact firms and individuals who should be affiliated with the chamber and assisting in protecting and expanding our business interests."

Mr. Hook will have as his advisory committee R. Roy Booth, A. A. Rogers, Carl R. Baker, Wayne Akers, Alton Baker and Edward F. Bailey, who will confer weekly on matters of policy.

Another division of the committee work will consist of canvassing members already affiliated by keeping in close touch with the general membership to avoid misunderstandings and in other ways keep in good standing those on the rolls. A. A. Rogers, W. B. Dillard and R. S. Bryson will assist Mr. Hook in this work.

A new division of this committee will help assimilate new members of the chamber, especially those locating in the city from other parts of the country. Early next year President Morris will bring up the matter of regular monthly meetings of the membership and on such occasions the new members will be introduced and efforts made to get them acquainted. It is also planned to have new members invited to attend service club luncheons where they may meet local business heads.

County Sues For Road Right of Way

Suit to condemn right of way through the farm of John Stalder and Laura E. Stalder for the Springfield-Cottage Grove secondary state highway was instituted in circuit court Wednesday by Lane county.

The county seeks to obtain a strip of land 60 feet wide and containing 1.19 acres for the road through this farm, the land being located in section 11, township 20 south of range 3 west.

The county alleges that \$50.50 is a reasonable value of the land and that the owners of the land will not be damaged more than \$100.

Last Concert of Term Is Sunday

It was with a feeling of reluctance that the audience left the music auditorium Sunday afternoon after John Stark Evans presented the last of a series of ten organ concerts, which each week have thrilled large numbers of university students and townspeople. The programs have been well balanced and charmingly presented, and offered a restful twilight hour of peace, undisturbed even by applause, which often mars enjoyment otherwise complete. Not only through their presentation of the best in music but because through the program notes appreciation is stimulated and directed, these concerts have become an invaluable part of university life, and it is hoped that they may be continued later in the year.

Some of the programs stressed a particular type of music, such as the Modern French, or the Scandinavian, while in others the interest was in the variety of numbers. On the program Sunday, Mr. Evans graciously included several request numbers, among them "Trump and Trombone" by Ellman, also familiar in choral arrangement, and "The Last Chord" by Sullivan. "The Long Day Closes," also by Sullivan, was very effective, sung from the organ by a quartet from the Eugene Glee-men.

An original improvisation on Christmas themes was particularly interesting. Three well known carols were arranged in unusual harmony, with excellent contrasts and fascinating modulation which used portions of the first theme to weave the melodies together very effectively.

Probably the most outstanding number from the point of technique was the stirring "Variations de Concert" by Bonnet, with pedal cadenza. The apparent difficulties of the pedal work were quickly met, the presentation was wholly satisfying, and the number particularly appropriate as a finale.

Next Sunday at this hour Gonnd's "St. Cecilia Mass" will be presented at the Methodist church and on the following Sunday, Dec. 11, the university choruses and orchestra will present the "Messiah" at McArthur Court.—M. S.

Dean John E. Bovard of the university school of physical education talked on the city playground work, explaining its program and its purposes, and asking for the club's moral support.

Earl O. Immel addressed the club on the program of dental education being given this week by Dr. Charles A. Sweet of Oakland, Cal., and national secretary of the national association for the promotion of dentistry for children. Dr. Sweet is coming under the auspices of the Lane county dental society, sent by the state board of dental examiners. Mr. Immel told of Dr. Sweet's program while here and praised the local dental society.

Coupe Hits Truck Tuesday Afternoon

An obstructed windshield resulted in a collision between a truck and small coupe at Sixth and Pearl streets Tuesday afternoon at 1:15 o'clock, according to Traffic Officer William Haviland, who investigated the crash.

According to the officer's report, F. J. Sutton, driving the coupe, struck a truck driven by L. E. Parks. Sutton's windshield had been broken previously and he had repaired it with a length of cardboard, shutting off his vision. He did not see the truck in the intersection of the streets, he told the officer.

Haviland instructed him to fix the windshield properly before moving his machine. The axle of the coupe was broken and a fender smashed. No one was injured.

27 Get Tuberculin Examination Here

Twenty-seven persons were given tuberculin tests at a clinic held in the courthouse Tuesday by the county public health unit.

Plans are being made for chest clinics to be held soon to follow up the work of tuberculosis prevention. Dr. Rellinger of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association will come here for the clinics.

University Again Chosen Art Center By Carnegie Group

The University of Oregon in the west and Harvard university in the east have again been chosen as art educational centers by the Carnegie corporation, and \$5500 will be available for scholarships in the school of fine arts here this coming summer. It was announced here Tuesday. News of the granting of the fund again was received by wire from Ellis F. Lawrence, dean of the school of fine arts, who is now in the east.

The fund, which provides sufficient money for all expenses for a number of art teachers in summer session, has been turned over to the educational committee of the American Institute of Architects, Dean Lawrence is chairman of this committee.

Last summer 19 art teachers studied on the campus here under the terms of the scholarships. Living expenses, materials and even train fare is included in the grant. Teachers come here from all parts of the west and all are from institutions of higher education.

Designation of the university as the western center for this work is regarded as a high recognition of the staff and the accomplishments of the institution in this field in the past.

Dean Lawrence, who is on leave of absence this year, has been in the east for several days, attending meetings of various organizations in his field.

Santa Is Invited To Visit Eugene

Santa Claus was given a special invitation on behalf of all the boys and girls of the Eugene trade territory to visit this city Saturday, Dec. 3, for a big Christmas reception, sponsored by the merchants division of the Eugene chamber of commerce, Monday night over the radio.

Old Mother Goose, noted composer of nursery rhymes, broadened the invitation for Santa Claus to visit this city. Mother Goose was introduced by E. G. Harlan, secretary of the chamber of commerce, and it was announced that Santa would broadcast his answer over KORE Tuesday night at 6:30 o'clock. Santa will speak from his North Pole home at midnight sharp, but the difference in North Pole time and Southern Willamette valley time will bring the message here at 5:30 sharp, it was announced.

It is planned to bring Santa here Saturday morning where children of this trade territory will gather to receive him at the corner of Eighth and Willamette streets. During the day Santa will visit the various stores of the city and will appear on Willamette street.

COUNTY BUDGET STORY

To keep him only through March. After that the work will be turned over to the county surveyor. Salaries of the county staff were reduced also. The shop foreman will be paid \$1500 a year instead of \$1800 as in 1932. The bridge superintendent will receive a like sum. His reduction was as great. The cost accountant was reduced to \$1080 from \$1440. An allowance of \$375 was made for the road superintendent during his short stay. He received \$1800 in 1932. The total budget for shops and the superintendent was set at \$5555, while in 1932 it was \$10,524. This is a saving of \$4969.

Two items in the budget make up the road fund. One is the item of market roads and the other the general road fund. The 1932 budget for market roads was \$82,820. The amount approved for 1933 Wednesday was \$86,000. The board allowed \$9,000 for bridges, \$12,000 for emergency, \$25,000 for maintenance, \$20,000 for oiling and rocking. The 1932 general road budget was \$194,000. The amount voted by the board for 1933 was \$140,700. This was allotted as follows:

Bridges, \$20,000; revolving fund and equipment, \$5,000; emergency and weak districts, \$10,000; right of way, \$5,000; new construction, maintenance and oiling, \$21,350; road districts, \$70,350.

Fisk, Young or O. E. Crowe, members of next year's court, would not say what money will be spent on various road projects. They said they have not yet decided. It is understood that very little new construction will be undertaken, and that all roads will be maintained.

Poor Fund Set
The care of the poor section of the budget was completed Wednesday. The county will raise \$50,000 by taxation, but this is expected to run short of the need by about \$15,000. So the committee took \$15,000 from the estimated receipts from Oregon and California land grant funds and applied it to the care of the poor.

The whole fund is divided as follows: Outside relief, \$25,000; hospitalization and medical aid, \$15,000; poor farm, \$10,000. The O. & C. fund taken out will be added into a new fund to be called the indirect work relief fund. The Red Cross office will be carried under the item of outside relief. No more than \$2500 will be used for the Red Cross.

Surveyor Cut
The board estimated that \$135,170 will be used to pay on bond interest and principal. It again dipped into the O. & C. money to pay \$45,000 of this. It will raise \$90,170 by taxation.

The county surveyor was allowed \$7975 for his salary. He had applied for \$8800. His deputies and assistants (chairmen) were cut to

\$2500 from \$3000. The stenographer was allowed \$1080 instead of the present \$1320 and an assistant office worker was given \$900 instead of \$975 applied for.

County Clerk W. B. Dillard presented an estimate of receipts the county may expect for 1933. He said the county might expect to collect \$25,000. He said \$17,000 would come from the county clerk's fees, \$500 from justice court fines; \$2,000 from sheriff's fees; auto license fees, \$1000; interest on daily bank deposits, \$1500; sale of lands, \$1000 and dog fund, \$2000.

MAN CHARGED WITH HAVING STINK BOMB

Charged with attempting to break a stink bomb in the Heilig theatre, John P. Lodge, Seattle, was turned over to county authorities Wednesday to be held for a preliminary hearing on his case Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

Lodge was arrested by city police Tuesday night at 9:30 o'clock after employees of the Heilig theatre had suspected him of having a stink bomb. Mrs. A. West Johnson, wife of the manager of the theatre, noticed the odor of the stink bomb when the man bought a ticket to the show shortly after 9 o'clock.

Mrs. Johnson told one of the ushers to watch the man while she called one of the men employees, Lodge, seeing he was being watched, hurriedly left the theatre, refusing to stop when he was requested to do so. Harlan Gresham, employee at the theatre, gave chase to the man and caught him at Fifth and Willamette, holding him till officers arrived.

Gresham told officers the man had thrown away the stink bomb as he ran and officers found the remains in an alley. The bomb was constructed of an old electric light globe, filled with the putrid liquid and sealed with sealing wax. Pieces of the broken bulb bearing the strong odor of the liquid were kept as evidence.

This is the second stink bomb assault on the Heilig, someone throwing one on Nov. 15. Officers were unable to determine whether Lodge was connected with the previous attempt since he denies it and produced an application for a chauffeur's license, taken out in Sacramento, Cal., and dated Nov. 15, the day of the other stink bomb throwing.
