HASKELL ATHLETIC DIRECTOR FIRED

LAWRENCE, Kas., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Frank W. McDonald, director of athletics at the Haskell Indian Institute, and Louis Weller, assistant coach, have been released by the athletic board with the statement that the action was taken because of the necessity for curtailment of sports.

McDonald, however, after his release was announced last night, asserted that in his case the contract was not renewed because of his political activities during the last campaign. He organized the Young Men's Democratic Club of Kansas, becoming its first president, and is chairman of the Douglas County Democratic committee. He also made public a letter he had received from J. Henry Scuttergood, assistant commissioner of Indian affairs, suggesting that the director limit his "political activity in the same way that other Haskell workers are required to do."

The contracts of both McDonald and Weller expire Dec. 31. No mention was made by the board of possible successors for the two.

McDonald, during whose 13 years as head of the department the Indian school has gained national reputation, particularly in football and track, previously had declared the republican administration had so lowered Haskell's scholastic status so as to make it virtually impossible to follow out an inter-collegiate sport program after the 1932-33 school year. At that time he said he would resign unless the school was returned to a junior college standing.

Another Lindbergh Kidnap Turns Up

BEAUMONT, Tex., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Ricco Fontino, 19, who introduced himself as a Chicago beer peddler, walked up to a policeman here today and "confessed" he helped kidnap Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.

At headquarters he said his conscience forced him to surrender. The police placed little credence in his story but ordered him held.

Fontino said the kidnapers were aided by a woman accomplice who worked in the Lindbergh home and that Harry Fleisher, Detroit gangster, also was a member of the kidnaping party.

After the kidnaping, Fontino asserted, the party drove to Hoboken where he said he was put out of the kidnapers' automobile. He said he was paid \$500 in advance for his part in the affair.

Defeated Candidate Asks For Recount

MEDEFORD, Ore., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Alleging enough votes to have elected him in the recent election were ignored because they were "incorrectly marked," Ralph Jennings, incumbent sheriff of Jackson county, has filed petition and notice for a recount of the vote which elected Gordon Schermerhorn sheriff.

Jennings ran as an independent "write-in" candidate after being defeated by Schermerhorn on the democratic ticket in the primary.
