

PRECIPITATION IN NOVEMBER TOTALS 4.99 INCHES HERE

Despite the fact it had but one entirely clear day, November's rainfall was more than half an inch less than for November of 1931, the monthly weather report reveals. The total precipitation for the month just passed was 4.99 inches as against 5.56 inches last year.

Both the maximum and minimum on the average ran higher than for November, 1931. The highest maximum recorded for the month was 70, on Nov. 17, and the lowest minimum was 31, on Nov. 11. The minimum for November has gone as low as 19.

The river held up comparatively high for this November. During the month there were 16 partly cloudy days, one clear day, and 13 cloudy days.

Charts on the highest maximums and lowest minimums for November since 1923 read as follows: 1923, 70 and 31; 1924, 73 and 20; 1925, 68 and 26; 1926, 64 and 19; 1927, 67 and 31; 1928, 70 and 32; 1929, 64 and 32; 1930, 64 and 27; 1931, 59 and 29; 1932, 63 and 30.

Precipitation charts for the past 11 Novembers run as follows: 1923, 4.99 inches; 1924, 5.56 inches; 1925, 3.90 inches; 1926, .80 of an inch; 1927, 5.97 inches; 1928, 6.01 inches; 1929, 10.75 inches; 1930, 4.57 inches; 1931, 9.78 inches; 1932, 2.78 inches.
