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Restriction Placed On Shipping Holly

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Holly shipped out of Oregon must be dipped in a solution to guard against the spread of tree disease, according to a statement made here today by federal plant quarantine inspectors.

Trees that have been inspected in July and September and have been found free of scales will be exempt from the dipping. A dipping plant will be opened in Portland.
