TODAY'S RECIPES

SOMETIMES a new recipe is the inspiration for a delightful meal, so today I'm trying to help you by giving you three recipes that use materials usually at hand in an unusual way.

Baked Onion and Potatoes

This is a good luncheon or supper dish. Serve it with a crisp salad of mixed greens and a hearty dessert which can be baked at the same time the main dish is baking.

Four large, white onions, 4 good sized potatoes, 1-2 teaspoon white pepper, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons melted butter or bacon fat.

Peel onions and pare potatoes. Cook together in boiling water until both are soft. Cut onions in thick slices in order that they may cook in the same length of time as the potatoes. Let water cook away as much as possible. Drain and mash vegetables. Add salt and pepper, milk and eggs well beaten. Beat thoroughly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Pour melted fat or butter over top and bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven.

Potato Cakes, Baked

This is an excellent way to use left-over mashed potatoes.

Two cups mashed potato, 2 tablespoons minced cooked meat, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 2 eggs, 4 thin slices bacon, bread crumbs.

Beat eggs until light and add with meat and parsley to potato. Mix lightly and add enough fine dried bread crumbs to make the mixture stiff enough to shape into flat cakes about one inch thick. Wrap a slice of bacon around each cake and fasten with wooden toothpicks. Bake on an oiled pan in a moderate oven until the bacon is crisp and the potato cakes brown on top.

Special Salad

One cup salted peanuts, 1 cup canned peas, 1 cup diced celery, 1-2 cup sliced American cheese, Russian dressing, shredded leaf lettuce.

Combine nuts, peas, celery and cheese with enough dressing to bind mixture. Serve at once on a bed of shredded leaf lettuce.

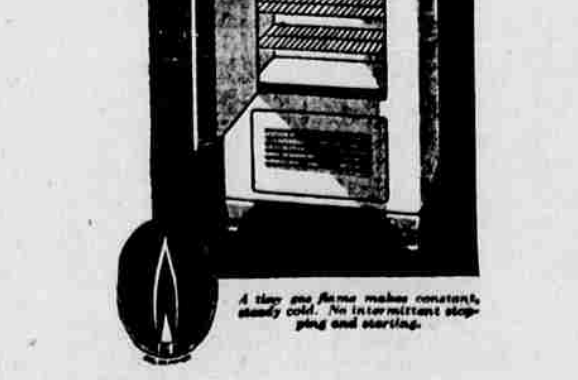
