

"MESSIAH" TO BE GIVEN ON DEC. 11 IN McARTHUR COURT

Handel's deathless oratorio, "The Messiah," presented by full chorus and orchestra, will again be the musical highlight of Eugene's Christmas season. For the third successive year, the University Polyphonic choir, assisted by the University Symphony orchestra, will fill McArthur court with the ring of the "Hallelujah." Sunday afternoon, Dec. 11, is the date set by Arthur Boardman, director, for this year's performance.

The fusion of Roy Bryson's Polyphonic chorus with the regular Polyphonic choir for this concert will give Boardman about 150 singers and a 65-piece orchestra to direct.

Management of the concert has been placed with Ronald H. Robnett, assistant graduate manager of the associated students, who announced that the ticket sale would open on the campus and in the business district early next week.

The names of four soloists have not yet been announced by Boardman, but he stated that this year all the soloists are Eugene students.

"The Messiah" was first presented as a Christmas concert by the University Polyphonic choir in 1930. A crowd that jammed the music building caused the 1931 performance to be held in McArthur court, where an audience of 2500 heard the oratorio. The performance has now been established as an annual tradition, and a large crowd is expected a week from Sunday.

Publicity on the concert is being sent to other cities, ranging from Salem to Roseburg, because of the interest shown in the Eugene concert last year by music-lovers of other cities who attended.

The Polyphonic chorus, formerly known as the "second division" of the Polyphonic choir, has had preliminary rehearsals for the Messiah with Roy Bryson, and the orchestra with Rex Underwood. Joint rehearsals conducted by Arthur Boardman began Tuesday.

Grave Robbers Get Scare When "Corpse" Arises From Coffin

BUCHAREST, Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—The story of a woman who was rescued alive from the grave by ghouls who intended to loot her coffin, thrilled Bucharest today.

Josefine Nagy, wife of a wealthy farmer, was buried Tuesday in the village cemetery of Treteneamare, central Transylvania, according to the story as it was told here. Wednesday night, three grave-robbers went to the cemetery, dug up the coffin and prepared to loot the grave.

They opened the casket and were horrified when the "corpse" moved. Josefine Nagy was alive. She arose, murmured "Where am I?" and stepped out of the coffin.

One of the robbers walked to her home, where her husband and family kept her out in the cold until they were convinced she was not a ghost.

Farmer Nagy helped police look for the robbers today. He did not want to punish them, but to "pay them for bringing Josefine back to me."

Small Ocean Craft Get Storm Warnings

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—Storm warnings for small craft were ordered at the mouth of the Columbia river and at points north today as the weather bureau forecast fresh to strong southwest winds today, diminishing tonight.

Continued cloudy weather with occasional rains was predicted for northwestern Oregon. Gusty winds and rain squalls persisted in Portland today.

Salem Milk Men May Get Higher Price

SALEM, Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—Salem milk distributors are slated to meet here Friday night, adding significance to unofficial reports that the dairy cooperative is demanding an increased price for milk.

Distributors here have been paying \$1.50 for milk, a price said to have been established when butterfat sold for 18 cents. With butterfat now selling for 20 cents, it is understood that the co-operative has asked \$1.90 for milk.

4-H Local Leaders Will Meet Tuesday

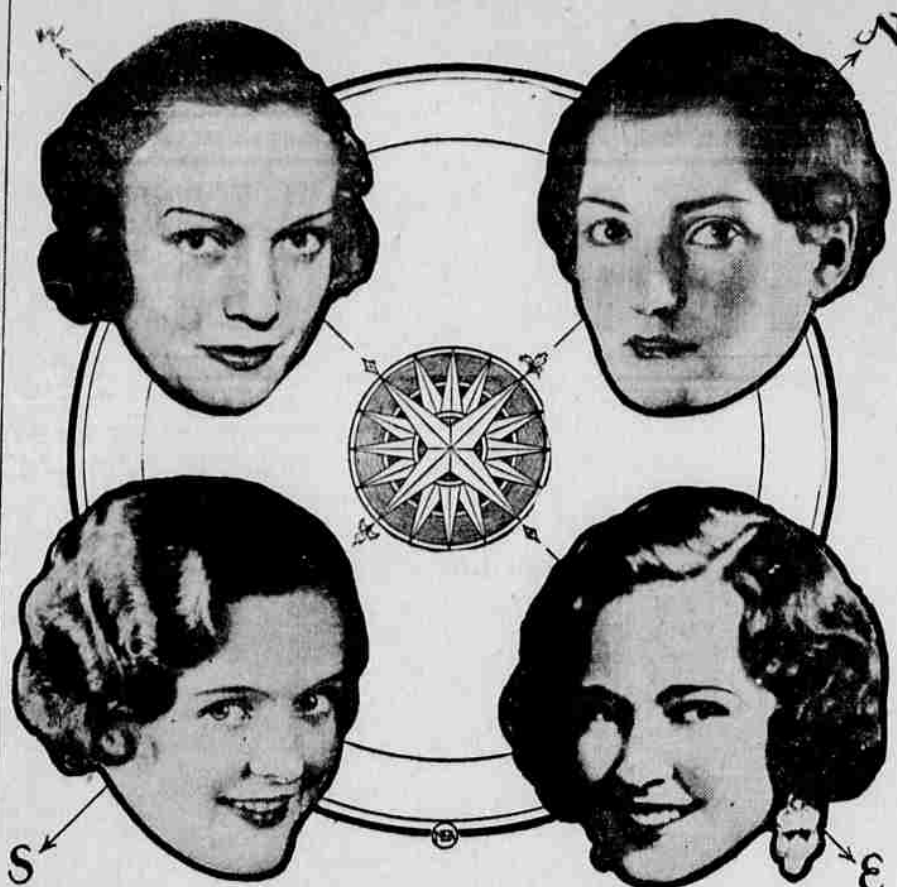
The Four-H Leaders' association will meet Tuesday at 7:30 p. m. at the chamber of commerce.

WAR DEBTS STORY

other debtors, President Hoover stated that no reasons had been advanced to justify suspending the December 15 payments.

He added that he would recommend to congress the formation of an agency to go over the whole situation with the debtor nations.

FRANCE JOINS BRITAIN WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—France joined Great Britain today with an urgent appeal for postponement of her Dec. 15 war debt payment, dispatching to Washington a note that revealed Anglo-French unity of opinion in the present debt crisis.

The note from Paris, sought flat postponement of the December payment of \$20,000,000 on the basis that such postponement was a "normal equitable necessity in the light of the Hoover moratorium."

The British note, equally as urgent in a final appeal for postponement of \$95,500,000 debt payment had warned of trade reprisals if the payment was forced.

Collection Unprofitable Poland will join the two great European powers in a similar appeal, it was reliably learned here.

The British held that war debts were clothing world commerce with a dead hand. They declared that the fall in international trade was cost-

ing the world \$5,000,000 per hour, and added:

"It will not profit a creditor country to collect a few million pounds or dollars if it thereby perpetuates a world disorder which, reacting on itself, involves losses of revenue many times greater."

With respect to the December payment, London held that it could pay only in gold and that the gold supply of the Bank of England was "no more than sufficient for the responsibilities of London as a financial center."

Britain's Hands Clean The note did not say positively whether Britain would, or would not, pay on Dec. 15 if congress refused to allow postponement.

The British argument for revision was based on the contention that commerce and industry cannot be stimulated until the burden of inter-governmental debts is lifted.

Further, London maintained, in its own special case, that British payments, amounting to 80 per cent of the entire amount America has received on war debts, entitled it to apply for revision with clean hands.

The note indicated that if America insisted on payment the British tariffs might have to be raised to create a favorable trade balance, thus hurting U. S. exports.

Despite America's claim that war debts and reparations are not connected, the British held that, in fact, they were. The note argued that since the former allies had freed Germany of reparations, they could not pay their own debts on the scale now established. If America insists on collecting war debts, Britain warned, the Lausanne reparations settlement cannot be ratified.

SIX ROBBERIES OF CABINS CLEARED UP

Sheriff's officers and state police announced Friday afternoon that six out of seven robberies of summer cabins on the McKenzie river have been cleared up by the arrest of C. R. Nelson of Eugene.

Nelson was arrested Wednesday night on a charge of stealing turkeys. Search of his house uncovered a still and much of the property stolen along the river, authorities said.

A. C. Dixon and J. A. McKevitt identified some of their property Friday afternoon and property of four other men has been found. Part of the loot is still missing.

Stoves, dish-ovens, food, furniture and guns were included in the recovered loot.

Nelson has not been arraigned in court.

Green Re-Elected Federation Head

CINCINNATI, Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—William Green today was unanimously chosen president of the American Federation of Labor, for the ninth consecutive year.

Green again reiterated his intention to use vigorous methods to gain acceptance of the federation's program of unemployment insurance and the 30-hour week.

"We must translate the militant spirit of this convention into action," he said. "We will plead for co-operation, but where we cannot get it, we will use every legitimate power at our command."

Lane School Census Has 15,043 Enrolled

Lane county has 15,043 persons of school age, according to a report on the county census made at the school office. Persons between the ages of 4 and 20 are included in the census.

Last year there were 14,881, this year's figure being an increase of 162. There were 7722 boys and 7321 girls reported.

"MUSIC BOX" WILL OPEN ON SATURDAY

A new music store, the "Music Box," will open to the public at 68 West Broadway, in the Graham block, Saturday, this date being set for the formal opening.

Ted Grubbs and C. P. McNab are the owners of the store and Ralph W. Wilson is manager. Mr. Grubbs was for five years with the Hobart M. Cable company of LaPorte, Ind., and for three years was general supervisor of Wiley B. Allen and company of San Francisco. He is also former manager for Sherman Clay and company and used to operate stores at Marshfield, Ore., South River, Cal., and Crescent City, Cal.

Mr. McNab is a musician and band leader, having been promoter and manager of the Elks band in Marshfield, leader of the Spanish Garden orchestra there and teacher of band and orchestra instruments. Mr. Wilson was with the Laraway music store here for a number of years.

Dr. Fowler Will Be Instructor On University Vessel

When the S. S. Slamet departs from New York February 4, carrying students and faculty members of the first official cruise of the American floating university, one of its educators will be William A. Fowler, who until two years ago was associate professor of business administration at the University of Oregon. Fowler, while here, specialized in foreign trade and won wide recognition through his surveys for markets for Oregon prunes, lumber and other products.

Mr. Fowler, who holds the degree of Master of Business Administration from this institution, has for the past two years been instructor in foreign trade in the Harvard University graduate school of business administration.

The vessel, which will carry approximately 400 students, will call at the usual world ports, and will be the first world cruising liner to call at Cartagena in South America, San Salvador in Central America, Balikpapan in Borneo. Other unusual places include Bali, Istanbul, Siam, Korea and Sumatland.

Dr. John J. Landbury of the university school of music here is a member of the advisory board of the organization.

CLATSOP GETS SHARE

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—Six inches of rain in the past 40 hours swelled rivers in the district about Astoria, bringing flood danger and sending slides down upon roads.

Early this morning a slide blocked the Columbia highway just east of Astoria. It was expected to be cleared away tonight. Another slide on the Cannon Beach road last night was cleared away this morning together with several fallen trees.

Rain still fell steadily today, increasing the danger of other slides. High water in Neawanna creek near Seaside forced removal of pupils at the Neawanna school early today for fear they would be marooned by water.

HIGHWAY BLOCKED

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—The Oregon Coast highway north of Seaside, Tillamook county, is blocked by a slide according to word received by the state highway department here today.

The only detour road in that section, the information said, is also blocked by a slide so that it will be impossible for traffic to get through along the coast until the damage is repaired which will probably require two or three days.

Fishing Season Is Closed Until April

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.—(U.P.)—With few exceptions the trout fishing season closed at sundown Wednesday night until April 15, 1933.

Exceptions are all streams below tidewater, the Sandy, Clackamas and Bull Run rivers and the Rogue and Illinois rivers.

Tidewater is open all winter for the taking of 10-inch or larger trout, as also are the Sandy, Bull Run and Clackamas rivers.

The Rogue and Illinois rivers are still open to six-inch fishing until Dec. 31, and for 10-inch fishing during January.
