

COOPERATIVE TO START ON THREE PROJECTS SOON

A cooperative exchange, to facilitate the barter of goods and services, with recourse to the money medium in only such instances as it proves indispensable, a cooperative cannery, and a cooperative sawmill, will all be opened in Eugene within a month or six weeks, sponsored by the Community Cooperative Alliance. The group made plans for the three projects and voted their establishment at a meeting Saturday at the Community Liberal church.

The exchange and the cannery will be established in Eugene. The sawmill has been suggested for a site near Jasper. Definite details on locations will be worked out at a later meeting.

In connection with the cooperative exchange, there will be a system of cataloging the needs and unemployed abilities and surplus products of the community at large, also, a form of mutual medical protection, the group announced. The cannery is to be established with view of elimination of food waste. The sawmill will be set up in conjunction with a small furniture factory.

Rev. Ernest M. Whitesmith, pastor of the Community Liberal church, opened the meeting with an address wherein he commended the institution of cooperative enterprise with the institution of marriage. Both, he pointed out, have a physical basis, in that both concern themselves with economic and other problems of an essentially material nature. Both, also, are doomed to failure, he added, save as they involve temperamental compatibility, the legitimate development of personality with a view thereby to making a definite social contribution. The concern of the Community Cooperative Alliance should be with the woes of humanity at large, he concluded, and not limited to its own economic salvation.

A board of trustees, consisting of a group of people who have pledged themselves to live the cooperative life with respect to consumption and production, both, have been vested with the executive authority of the C. C. A. The individuals are: Mary Hilburn Jackson, Eugene; Leo Giddings, of Harrisburg; Alvin Bristol, of the Cooperative Farm; Joseph Muhr of Clatsop County; D. M. Rankin of Crow Stage.

A third conference has been slated for December 17.

Warning Is Issued By Civil Service

The United States Civil service commission is warning the public against payment of money for "coaching" courses in preparation for federal civil service examinations. Money paid for such courses at this time might almost as well be thrown to the four winds, it is stated in a civil service bulletin. There are a great number of civil service coaching "schools," "institutes" or "bureaus" in the United States. Doubtless thousands are paying money to these schools in the expectation of getting a government position. Practically all of them will be disappointed, it is stated. In the last railway postal clerk examination, held in three states only, there were more than 7,000 applicants. (Based on population, approximately 400,000 would have applied if the examination had been held throughout the country). There are more than 10,000 eligibles on existing railway postal clerk registers, while exactly seven appointments were made throughout the country between January 1 and June 30, 1932.

In the last stenographer-typist examinations there were 57,822 applicants; and there are approximately 2800 persons eligible for the civil service district eligible for appointment as a result thereof. In the last immigrant inspector examination there were 10,023 applicants; while 475 eligibles therefrom are available for appointment in the 11th district. In the civil clerk examination last held there were 34,233 applicants; in the last prohibition agent examination, 15,415 applicants; and the figures are representative of general conditions. Very few of these thousands of eligibles will ever be appointed; in fact, the number of appointments will be negligible, it is pointed out.

The commission cannot control the number of applicants in its examinations. Under the law, examinations must be open and competitive. However, it is the policy now to hold an examination only as a final resort.
