"If you cry any more I'll give you something to cry about. You cry all the time—I can't see a word in you and I'm all out of patience. Go and hide yourself. I'm ashamed of you!"

Nancy's chin quivered uncontrollably, her small lip pressed together to hold in the sobs. Then she fled to nurse her hurt feelings in her own room. Her first reaction was one of indignation and humiliation. Was ever a little girl so mistreated, so abused, so insulted as she had been? Her own dear mother, who nearly always took her on her knee and wanted to know all about it! Those bad boys who had laughed at her hat—those mean girls who hurried to eat up the last piece of candy just as she came along! The knee that got bumped, the hair that got tangled, the movie she couldn't go to!

Just the same . . . she was sobering up. She was thinking instead of feeling. She wanted terribly to have her mother on her side again. Could she smile? She tried it and found she could. No, maybe that wouldn't do. Perhaps if her mother saw how terrible she felt about the scolding she would be sorry. It wouldn't do to clear up too quickly. She could hear her mother say: "You poor little dear! I didn't mean to be so cross! Oh, please stop crying, dear, and we'll go and see the puppies in the pet store."

She opened her door. Her mother was dusting the stairs. Nancy was still sobbing and looking very miserable. "Get back in there and don't come out till you can smile," said her mother sharply.

She tried again. Nancy went back and made a grimace at herself in the mirror. So that was it! She suppressed the hiccup and drew up the corners of her mouth. "That's the girl," said her mother later. "You're too big to cry any more."

TODAY'S RECIPES

THERE'S usually a lull after Thanksgiving that permits the busy house-maker to bake the Christmas fruit cake and plum puddings. Both of these delicacies are better if baked several weeks before needed. There is an endless fruit cake known as an old-time recipe and based on "perk cake."

Eggless Fruit Cake
One pound fat salt pork, 2 cups boiling water, 2 cups light brown sugar, 1 cup molasses, 1 whole nutmeg grated, 2 tablespoons cinnamon, 1 tablespoon cloves, 1 pound seeded raisins, 1 pound currants, 1 pound stoned dates, 1-2 pound citron, 1-2 pound candied cherries (optional), 2 cups chopped nut meats, 4 tablespoons strong coffee infusion, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 8 cups flour, 1 tablespoon vanilla.

Remove rind and all bits of lean meat from salt pork. Chop fat very fine and put into a warm mixing bowl. Pour over boiling water, mix thoroughly and let stand until cool. The hot water will melt most of the fat. Add sugar and molasses. Mix prepared fruit and sift over 1 cup of flour. Mix well. Mix and sift remaining flour with baking powder and spices. Add with prepared fruit to first mixture.

Paper Holds Moisture
Add nuts, coffee, vanilla and soda dissolved in 2 teaspoons cold water. Mix thoroughly and turn into pan lined with heavy parchment paper. Stretch and the heavy waxed or parchment paper over each loaf of cake.

This prevents moisture leaving the cake and also prevents moisture settling on top of cake during steaming. Steam two hours and then bake forty minutes in a slow oven.

The one essential for the perfect cake is moisture and to insure this quality the cake is steamed and then baked. Prolonged baking has a tendency to dry the fruits while only steaming fails to produce a cake-like texture. Consequently the combination of cooking methods is ideal.

DINNER: Oven dinner of meat loaf, scalloped potatoes, baked carrots, endive with cheese dressing, cranberry pudding, milk, coffee.
