- averaging about 122 per cent estimated to bring a saving of \$55,000,000. 2. Elimination of public works. 3. Savings of \$89,380,247 in appropriations for war veterans.

There were no suggestions for revision of income or corporation taxes. There was no recommendation for changing the increased postal rates now in effect.

The recommended appropriations for prohibition enforcement was \$850,000 less than that for the current year. The message listed an estimated need for 1934 of \$9,590,048, compared with the 1933 appropriation of \$10,250,000.

Proposals to make fraternity and sorority property exempt from taxation were opposed by E. C. Sammons, chairman of the finance committee of the state board of higher education, in a letter to County Assessor Ben F. Keeney Wednesday.

Sammons told Keeney that fraternities have considered deeding their property to the state board of higher education and obtaining long term leases from the board.

Referring to the first plan Sammons stated, "I propose to fight such a movement to the full extent of my energy and ability."

According to Keeney, exemption of fraternity and sorority property on the University of Oregon campus would strike \$434,206 from the assessment roll.

District Attorney Alta King will return to Cottage Grove and practice law after the year. He has served four years as district attorney and has also served as city recorder of Eugene and as chief deputy sheriff of Lane county.

Politics is politics, and I'm not sure about not being renominated and elected," Mr. King said. "I've tried to be fair and impartial to all and I have no regrets. I believe that Eugene V. Slattery and myself have conducted the office as well as any district attorney the county has had. I feel that since I am dry I would not fit in with the coming wet movement in the state anyhow."
