TODAY'S RECIPES

THE rich black fruit cake is a Yuletide favorite—best if made several weeks before it goes to grace the table.

Chocolate is added for richness and color. Brandy, which was supposed to be the preservative of fruit cake, is not used in this recipe. Thorough baking, chocolate and the use of strong coffee or fruit juice in the place of milk will keep a cake moist for weeks and produce a delicious flavor.

Black Fruit Cake

Two cups shortening (butter and lard mixed), 1 cup light brown sugar, 10 eggs, 1 cup molasses, 1 cup liquid (orange juice, sweet cider or grape juice), 4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 tablespoon powdered cinnamon, 1 tablespoon powdered allspice, 1 teaspoon powdered cloves, 2 teaspoons grated nutmeg, 3-4 cake bitter chocolate, 2 pounds seeded raisins, 1 pound seedless raisins, 1 pound cleaned currants, 1-2 pound shredded citron, 1-2 pound candied cherries, 1-2 pound candied pineapple, 1-4 pound candied lemon peel, 1-4 pound candied orange peel, 2-3 cups blanched and shredded almonds, 2 tablespoons vanilla, 1 teaspoon salt.

Prepare fruit and almonds. Cut cherries in halves and pineapple in thin slices. If citron and candied peels must be sliced and shredded, warm well before cutting. Mix prepared

fruits and sift 1 cup flour over them. Mix well with a fork until perfectly blended. Cream shortening and slowly beat in sugar. Add prepared fruit and mix well. Add eggs well beaten and beat this mixture hard.

Now Add Chocolate

Add molasses, chocolate melted over hot water and the liquid. Mix well. Mix and sift remaining flour, soda and spices. Sift these ingredients several times to be sure the soda is well mixed with the flour. Add to batter with nuts and vanilla and beat until smooth and perfectly blended. Turn into prepared cake pans, cover with paper as in preceding recipe and steam three hours. Remove from steamer and bake forty-five minutes in a slow oven.

When cake is removed from the oven, place in clean towel or a cake cooler. Pull cloth over pan to cover it completely. Let stand until cool. Then wrap closely in heavy waxed paper and store in a tight tin box until wanted.

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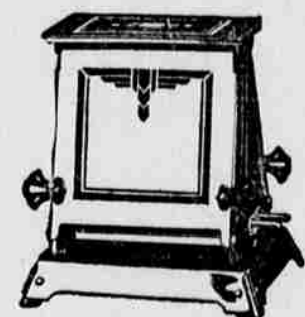
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
