SOUTH LANE TAX GROUP ASKS FOR VALUE REDUCTION
COTTAGE GROVE, Dec. 8.—(Special)—A 25 per cent reduction in the assessed valuation of all farm and pasture lands and all town and city lots and other real property is asked for in a resolution adopted at the meeting of the South Lane County Taxpayers' league Tuesday evening. The resolution further urged that the program of reduction of taxes and economy in the Lane county government be further augmented by keeping the millage at or below the present figure.
A resolution to the County Court recommending the adoption of a policy whereby in the proper cases a taxpayer may present a petition to the court requesting the waiver of interest and penalties on delinquent taxes was adopted and ordered forwarded to the county court. A resolution addressed to Fred Fisk, Cal Young and the other members of the budget committee in which the South Lane County Taxpayers league expressed its thanks for the showing made in the recent budget reductions and expressing entire satisfaction with the results, was read and adopted by unanimous vote.
A letter was read from one of the recently elected representatives on the automobile license question in which he expressed himself as being in accord with the views of the South Lane Tax league.
W. B. Dillard was the principal speaker of the evening and he presented an address in which he made comparisons of the inequalities in taxes and in the unequal redistribution of tax money in the various sections of the county. Mr. Dillard's speech was technical, but was put in such a comprehensive way as to be readily understandable and much knowledge was gained by many of those present that will be of value in the future.
The regular meeting night was changed from the first Tuesday of the month to the second Monday of the month.
