YOUR CHILDREN

CHILDREN are very sensitive about what their parents do, the things they say, the way they act. No so long ago I heard a little six-year-old girl say, when a friend of her mother said, "I don't like my mother to smoke."

Her mother said, "Why, Betty, I don't smoke! Only once or twice, when we have had company in and I did it just for fun. But anyway, you must not criticize me. I'm too good to you."

Later we discussed the problem of children being sensitive about what their parents do. It was no more a dissertation on the right or wrong of cigarette, but rather on how far we should allow children to shape our conduct. She stuck to her point.

Many mothers feel as my friend did that their own habits and personality are matters entirely removed from the jurisdiction or opinions of their children. I don't think so. Children are people with standards of their own. Where they get these standards no one can precisely tell. They hear, they think, they see, they decide. These judgments are immature and occasionally wrong; but this is strange—mostly they are right, whether we like to acknowledge it or not.

One time I heard a father say he looked over his cocktail glass at his son. "Billy doesn't like me to drink. Forget it, Billy! When you are a man and come home as tired as I do you'll want a pick-up before dinner, too."

Billy didn't answer and left the room. His father was angry. And he began to harangue his wife about bringing up the boy to be a "prissy" who disapproved of his father.

It's just this way. Children feel a certain stigma that reflects upon themselves if either of their parents do things they think are not right. Selfish? I don't think it is that. Something just seems to sink inside them. They couldn't explain it themselves.

Personal liberty, using one's own judgment about what one wants to do, I still feel is the right of every child, including parents. I am tired of one group of people telling another group what it may or may not do.

TODAY'S RECIPES

THERE are several different types of plum puddings—rich, eggless, bread or cracker crumb and graham or entire wheat flour, but if one wants to make a pudding that will keep indefinitely a rich recipe like the following should be chosen. Plum pudding steamed in small bowls makes a most attractive Christmas gift and one that is sure to be appreciated.

Rich Plum Pudding
One-half pound suet, 1 pound cleaned currants, 1-2 pound seeded raisins, 1-2 pound stale bread crumbs, 1-4 pound candied orange peel, 1-4 pound citron, 4 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup dark brown sugar, 2 tablespoons orange juice or grape juice or sweet cider, 4 tablespoons flour.

Chop suet very fine and work with pastry blender until creamy. Chop currants and raisins and shred citron and orange peel. Mix fruit and sift over flour. Mix well and add to suet. Mix and add bread crumbs, yolks of eggs well beaten, spices, sugar and fruit juice. Mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff. Turn into buttered bowls or molds, filling molds not more than two-thirds full. Cover securely with heavy parchment paper or a floured cloth and plunge into a kettle of boiling water. Boil hard for four hours. Boil again for two and one-half hours when wanted for serving.

Every Man's Plum Pudding

This pudding is less rich but very good. One cup finely chopped suet, 1 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 cup milk, 8 cups flour, 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon each cloves and nutmeg, 1-2 cups seeded raisins, 1 cup currants, 4 tablespoons shredded citron, 1-2 cup shredded orange and lemon peel (candied), 1 cup shredded almonds.

Mix suet and molasses. Add soda and stir until mixture foams. Mix and sift flour, salt, cream of tartar and spices. Add with milk to first mixture. Mix well and add fruit and nuts which have been chopped and mixed with an extra half cup of flour. Mix thoroughly and turn into a large mold or two smaller ones. Cover and steam four hours. When used, steam one hour to reheat thoroughly.

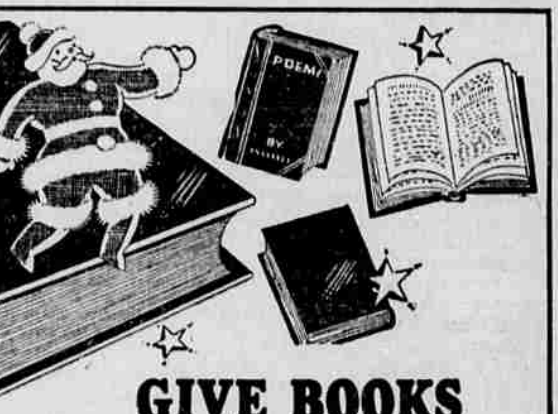
