

48 DAIRIES NOW PRODUCING BEST GRADE MILK HERE

There are 48 Grade "A" dairies producing milk either to be sold as raw or for pasteurization in Eugene, an increase of 21 more than in the previous report, it was announced by Chester M. Lawrence, city milk inspector, in a report given out Saturday. In the previous survey, 27 were listed. "The milk supply of Eugene is showing a gradual improvement," Mr. Lawrence said.

The entire milk supply to the Eugene Farmers' creamery for market milk and cream is produced in grade "A" dairies. The Medo-Land creamery and Reid's creamery will have their entire milk supply coming from grade "A" dairies. Grade "A" and grade "B" milk when pasteurized become grade "A" pasteurized. Grade "B" milk can not be sold raw except for a period not exceeding 30 days when a dairy is degraded, Mr. Lawrence explained.

The following dairies and creameries are rated grade "A" for the grading period just ended, being arranged in alphabetical order: Hans Bodker, A. O. Bush, Cloverleaf dairy, Chula Vista dairy, G. J. DeVos, H. Deertz, A. P. Junger (Danish), Nels Kage, Echo Hollow, Elliotts dairy, R. L. Galloway, Mrs. Lillie Hayes, Jeffries dairy, Anne Grisham, H. J. L. Laine, H. C. Gray, Virgil Liles, L. L. Miller, Carl Peterson, M. N. Pomeroy, H. L. Plank, J. K. Prall, R. B. Thompson, R. B. Witbeck, Wild Rose dairy, Valleyfield dairy.

The pasteurizing plants in grade "A" have been increased by the addition of the Eugene Milk Producers plant during the period. The following are grade "A" pasteurized plants now: Eugene Farmers' creamery, Eugene Milk Producers association, Medo-Land creamery, Reid's creamery.

At the Pacific Livestock show in Portland the last three years the Eugene Farmers' creamery has won an award for pasteurized milk and the Echo Hollow and Cloverleaf dairies have won in the raw milk class. This year at Portland those selected above won again and also Virgil Liles, R. L. Galloway and J. K. Prall walked off with high honors. Then at the Pacific Livestock show at Oakland in competition with dairies from many western states and Honolulu, Virgil Liles, Echo Hollow dairy, Cloverleaf dairy, and J. K. Prall entered in the raw milk class and all scored above 98 per cent, and in the pasteurized milk class the Medo-Land creamery was second with a score of 96.85 reported incorrectly previously as a score of 98.5 and the Eugene Farmers' creamery was close behind the Honolulu Dairymen's association, the only other dairy outside of California to receive a prize. The outstanding feature is the fact that every dairy entered at Oakland scored highly and the milk was samples picked from the regular supply in course of delivery to Eugene homes. These contests show that our milk supply must rate high in comparison with other communities. All entries raw and pasteurized were produced on grade "A" dairies up to grade "A" standards, Mr. Lawrence said.
