green above zero was recorded Monday, said the Willamette river was frozen nearly completely across, only a small channel being left in the center of the stream. It is unusual for the river to freeze in this manner, residents claiming such phenomena has not been seen since 1924, and not for many years prior to that date. Winberry creek, Fall creek and other smaller streams in that region were all frozen over.

At Junction City, reporting a minimum of eight degrees, many skated on the pond near the northern boundary of the town and in Eugene skating was in order on the mill race and youngsters skidded along on the Amazon.

Ice Gives Trouble
Water board officials were concerned with the problem of ice in the two power canals at Leaburg and Waltherville Monday, two different problems confronting the engineers in this respect. At the Waltherville plant, three shifts were being worked, crews being kept busy 24 hours a day clearing the ice from the canal at the opening of the penstocks at the plant. The ice in this stream was of the type known as "anchor ice," a slushy type which floats in the stream but is not solid. It is unusual to find this sort of thing here, J. W. McArthur, superintendent of public utilities here, said, especially in that this sort of formation is noted only in the Waltherville canal and in the river near Waltherville. Above and below, it is not so evident.

The men at the Waltherville plant are kept on the canal, working this slushy ice formation past the penstocks and down the spillways.

Synchons Freeze
In the Leaburg canal, a sheeting of ice covers the surface of the water in the forebay, but is not interfering with the intake of the penstocks. It was reported, there is no anchor ice in this canal, but some trouble was experienced with the synchons used as a spillway at the plant. The ice coated the vents which control the automatic action of the synchons, causing them to continue working after they should have stopped and bringing the water in the canal down to too low a level. It was necessary to clear the ice away and let more water into the canal to keep a sufficient head for the power requirements of the plant.

Water board employees were keeping a close watch over the ice to be ready for it when it breaks up to prevent it damaging the intake of the penstocks.

Camps Still Down
Residents of Eugene will pay only this minimum rate for water this month as it is impossible to get the boxes out of the ground to read the water meters now, it was announced. Therefore, next month, residents will be billed for that month's water and for the amount over the minimum used this month. More than 40 calls from residents asking to have the water turned off were answered from the water board office Sunday.

Locking operations at Wendling and Westfir were still down Monday from effects of the cold weather and it was reported that the Oakridge schools were unable to conduct classes due to the cold.
