

## CHRISTMAS SEAL RECEIPTS AMOUNT TO \$600 SO FAR

Returns for the first two weeks of the annual Christmas seal mail campaign amount to \$600. In spite of the many seals regrettably returned this compares favorably with returns for the same period last year. Mrs. Frank Chambers, seal sale chairman of the Lane County Public Health association, reported Tuesday morning.

New momentum will be given the drive this week toward the goal of approximately \$2700, or five cents from each person in Lane county. Christmas seal day and banking day were held simultaneously in Eugene's schools Tuesday, and the sale is to continue until the end of the week. Thursday, Dec. 15, the annual booth sale will begin, under the direction of Mrs. Denzil Abel of the Welfare league.

Each of the four days of the booth sale will be under the supervision of a separate chairman. Miss Charlotte Winnard, president of the Lane County Nurses' association, will schedule hours at which members of her organization will be on duty Thursday. Miss Isabelle Hefner, grand regent of the Catholic Daughters of America, will head the sale on Friday. Mrs. David Graham and Mrs. L. Scharp will be in charge of Welfare league workers at the booths on Saturday and Monday.

"Checks are still coming in made out to the Red Cross," Mrs. Chambers said. "I wish I could impress upon everyone's mind that the Christmas seal is not a Red Cross seal, and that the National Tuberculosis association is separate and distinct from the National Red Cross, and has been so since 1919. Their work is relief of suffering, ours is its prevention. Their campaign for funds officially ended when ours began at Thanksgiving."

## 8 MEET VIOLENT DEATH IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Metropolitan Chicago counted eight deaths by violence today—six by guns cracking and reverberating in near zero temperatures; one by suffocation when robbers left a woman victim to die after blinding and gagging her, and another by stabbing. Of the six, three were policemen, one a hand, another an alleged automobile thief and another a former lightweight boxer.

The killings occurred within a few hours of an anti-crime ultimatum delivered by Mayor Anton J. Cermak to the city's police captains.

There is such a lot of satisfaction in buying a quality article even if you do have to skip a bit here and there to do it, and I doubt if in its field there is anything much nicer than "Martex" bath towels, mats and cloths. Here is a whole set, all done up in a box and cellophane, and the price is \$2.50.
