ward "too much government." He upbraided the state police plan as non-essential, insisted there is no need until taxpayers are better able to pay for them. Maintenance we shall have to continue under the best makeshifts of economy."

Judge Graham declared state employees should be under civil service regulations where men could qualify by right examination.

Frank Shull, commissioner of Multnomah county, said that as far as his county is concerned, the state police force could be eliminated and "no one would miss it." The sheriff's office, he declared, is perfectly capable of coping with the situation.

Judge Robert W. Sawyer of Bend urged the members to consider carefully the plan to reduce automobile license fees, "or that counties will find themselves in trouble."

Those attending the convention believed that later in the day the officials would adopt a resolution favoring a state sales tax. It was said another resolution would call for a \$5 auto license fee plus an increase of one cent a gallon on the gasoline tax.

### Air Pictures of Big Burn Taken

P. A. Thompson, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, and Lutz Westnstedt, forest service photographer of Portland, flew over the big Tioza burn west of Roseburg Saturday and took aerial photographs of the damage done by the fire.

The flight from Eugene to Roseburg was made in 30 minutes. The plane, a Hobb ship, was assisted by a tail wind. From the fire area 25 miles west of Roseburg the men could see the ocean from Cape Blanco to Hecla Head and Mt. Shasta in California.

The Tioza fire was the largest of the last fire season. It burned in privately owned timber.

STATE IS WARMER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 13.—(AP)—The first indication that Oregon's prolonged cold spell may be breaking was given by the government weather bureau here today. Temperatures over the state last night were generally higher than for the past several days.

The forecast today predicted "fair weather tonight and Wednesday, probably cloudy Wednesday." But little change in temperature was expected, however, and easterly winds were in the offing, indicating that a positive definite break toward more nearly normal conditions can not yet be predicted.

Portland's minimum for the night was 21 degrees, the highest since last Wednesday. Baker had a low of 4, up 2 degrees from Monday; North Bend was 30, up 4 degrees; Roseburg 10 up 2 degrees; Medford 20, up 2 degrees; Bend 8 below, down 2 degrees; and Burns 2 below, down 2 degrees.

money" owed the United States by foreign governments and charged him with conducting conversations with foreign representatives "inimical to the United States."

The resolution said Hoover had "unlawfully attempted to usurp and has usurped legislative powers and functions of the congress of the United States," and has violated the constitution.

It charged that Mr. Hoover had "pursued a policy inimical to the laws of the United States by employing means to influence the deliberations of the legislative branch of the government and has interfered with freedom of debate in congress and has forced unsound and unconstitutional legislation upon the people, which violations make him guilty of high crimes and misdemeanors and subject to impeachment."
