PHILIPPINES
STORY

Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.), and was approved 44 to 20.

Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.) made a bitter attack on this provision, saying it left no way for the Philippines to express themselves, if they find fault with their economic disadvantages, "except through revolution which would precipitate intervention."

Repulchra had predicted President Hoover would veto the bill, es-

pecially if the plebiscite provision is included.

Senator Haves made a dramatic last-minute appeal for independence, but, like other supporters of the measure as it came from committee, opposed the Byrnes amendment.

The senate bill would make the import quotas effective for seven years. For the next five years preceding independence, the islands would be authorized to collect export taxes and use the money to help pay off their bonded indebtedness. The house bill makes no provision for such taxes.

U. S. Reserves Rights
The taxes would be five per cent of normal American tariff the first year and would increase five per cent each through the five year period.

The import quotas, which their sponsors said would maintain the status quo of free trade, would be as follows:

Sugar, 555,000 tons of raw and 30,000 tons of refined.
Coconut oil, 150,000 long tons.
Hemp products, 3,000,000 pounds.
Pending consummation of independence, the United States would be presented in the islands by a high commissioner.

The United States also reserves the right to retain its present military, naval and other reservations in the islands, and that after independence is complete, the United States may obtain, by lease or purchase, any additional territory in the islands it may deem necessary.
