Mr. Schoelling had suffered from asthma for 20 years, but had not been in a serious condition until about a month ago. Three sons and his widow survive: C. A. should the motor vehicle license fee be reduced by the legislature to \$5 there would be a loss of \$2,250,000 in highway revenue, making it impossible to undertake construction on a large scale unless the reduced revenue was replenished from new sources. The reduced fee, he said, would leave the commission about \$750,000 short in meeting its debt service, its maintenance charges and overhead expense. There would be no money to match federal aid. After Scott had revealed the financial position of the department, it is said, representatives of Jackson county announced their willingness to forego the Siskiyou project at this time. "As compensation," the story continued, "it was decided to straighten out a crooked section of highway between Ashland and Talent at an estimated cost of \$100,000, and to rebuild the Winston bridge over the Umpqua south of Roseburg." Other Jobs May Wait The paper states that should the commission decide to carry out the policy indicated "fairness would seem to require" postponement of construction of the Wilson River highway at \$3,000,000; the Wolf Creek or short road to the sea at \$4,000,000; the Klamath Falls-Wood extension of the Dallas-California highway at \$500,000, and the Santiam highway at \$1,000,000. The conclusion that postponement of these projects is imminent is drawn from the action of the commission in deciding not to go ahead with the Siskiyou work.

TURKEYS WILL BE SHIPPED SATURDAY

Loading will be made in Eugene on Dec. 24 and birds will be received here up to 3 p. m. that day. Loading will be made at Albany and McMinnville up to 3 p. m. the 25th, at Oakland up to 2 p. m. the 26th and at Roseburg up to 2 p. m. the 27th.

SPRINGFIELD, Dec. 20.—(Special)—At the first meeting of representatives of several organizations in the city Monday evening preliminary plans were laid to provide food and toys for a large number of families in this city whose Christmas will probably not be very joyous. Each of the 123 children in the city whose parents will be unable to provide them with Christmas gifts will be given toys by the committee, it was planned Monday evening. Already a large number of toys has been collected, but many more are needed. Anyone having toys to contribute may leave them at John Anderson's garage, Niel Pollard's plumbing shop, or the city hall. Several groups in the city are planning to send Christmas baskets to

needy families, and the names of those families which will receive the baskets was checked off the list. The remaining families will be provided for by the committee and the Red Cross. The former started soliciting Tuesday morning for funds with which to purchase meat for each family, and the Red Cross is to furnish staple groceries for each group. ones, must be had from the state college team. Schissler now is in the east and further discussion of his status will wait until his return. Of the \$5,000 annually paid the football coach, \$5,000 is furnished by the student association, and \$5,000 by the state. The board received from Hugh Ross, director of athletics at the university, a request for approval of Coach Frank Callison's football coaching contract at \$5,200 for another year. The board took no action, however, preferring to await such time as the present contract expires before approving a renewal. Callison's present agreement runs until June. The request that girls at the state college no longer be obliged to live for an entire year at dormitories before entering sorority houses was referred to the chancellor. At the request of faculty members of the university the board repealed the rule

prohibiting faculty members from becoming political candidates.

APPROVAL WAITS ROUTINE
Hugh Ross, director of athletics, said Tuesday the final approval of the re-hiring of Coach "Pink" Callison would await the meeting of the state board of education in April, following the action of the board in postponing approval at the meeting in Portland Monday. Approval of Callison as coach has been voiced by the athletic committee of the associated students and now awaits final approval of the board. This is merely a matter of form, it was pointed out, since every employee of the university must be approved by the board. Action is expected to be taken along with the approval of other teachers by the board in April, the customary time.

night continued with only slightly lessened intensity today and storm warnings were up again from Marshfield to Tatoosh island for strong south and southwest winds, reaching gale force at night. An inch of rain fell in Portland during the night, bringing the precipitation here for the past two days to 3.20 inches. Moderate temperatures prevailed over the state. One-way traffic was permitted today over the Columbia river highway at Onatona gorge, but the road was in dangerous condition in several places. Yesterday all eastbound traffic

was stopped by slides on the Columbia highway and ice on the Evergreen highway on the north shore of the Columbia river.

WIND DOES DAMAGE
SEATTLE, Dec. 20.—(AP)—High winds that howled across western Washington and Oregon causing thousands of dollars damage, moderated gradually today. But rains, which yesterday overflowed rivers, inundated hundreds of acres of farm lands, flooded railroad tracks and highways, will continue, weather reports said. Destruction flitted over the two states on the wings of a 40-60 mile gale yesterday, sending high waves and driftwood crashing into beach cottages, killing cattle, barnyard fowls and bees, halting traffic and smashing power lines. Bridges Threatened Newspapersmen estimated damage to cottages and property on Puget Sound alone at almost \$100,000. Small craft were shattered and sunk, basements flooded, bench houses and houseboats made untenable and citizens were terrified, many fleeing to higher ground. Mukilteo, Mission Beach, Priest Point, and Stanwood, all near Everett, suffered greatest damage in Washington. County road crews struggled near Kennewick, Wash., to save two wooden bridges and a steel one, menaced by eight miles of ice flows in the Yakima river, which had been dynamited in a vain effort to make them harmless.
