

LIONS HEAR REPORT ON TOY CAMPAIGN; PROF. NOBLE TALKS

Members of the Eugene Lions club heard reports on the Christmas toy drive at their regular meeting Wednesday afternoon at the Eugene hotel.

W. R. Robertson, drive chairman, and George Stock, chairman of the "receiving" committee, reported that 8517 toys have been put in perfect condition for distribution to needy families and that about 400 are being made ready to add to the collection. The list of toys received includes 385 dolls, 270 pieces of doll furniture, 25 wagons, 289 autos, 390 games, 195 books, 238 mechanical toys, 288 pieces of wearing apparel for dolls and children and hundreds of other toys.

President Wayne Akers appointed a committee for distribution of toys. On the committee are Dr. C. D. Donahue, chairman, F. M. Hathaway, Merle Chase, P. J. Chase, Hugh Curran and A. L. Hawn.

Harold J. Noble, professor of history in the University of Oregon, spoke at the luncheon on his experiences in the Orient. He described Manchuria, Korea and China during the recent Manchurian warfare and told of the attitudes of Japanese toward their neighbors and toward the people of the United States.

Lawrence Pennington, president of the Medford Lions club and a former Eugene resident, was a visitor. He praised the Eugene club for its activity in the toy drive and outlined the work of the Medford club, which has established a soup kitchen and bank-house for needy persons.

Edward F. Bailey, F. M. Hathaway and Henry Burch were named on a committee to greet guests.

The spirit of the program was provided by Ferris Hathaway and his troupe of yo-yo specialists. S. M. Calkins, L. L. Ray and Ed Bailey twirled the yo-yo in a contest.

Winter Wheat This Year Totals Near 40 Million Acres

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Winter wheat for next year's crop sown this fall was reported today by the department of agriculture to total 39,992,000 acres, or 98.7 per cent of the acreage sown in the fall of 1931. The condition of the crop Dec. 1 was 68.9 per cent of a normal, compared with 70.4 a year ago, and an average of 83.3 for the ten years 1920-29.

Rye, for all purposes, sown this fall total 4,649,000 acres, or 93.0 per cent of the acreage sown in the fall of 1931.

The condition of rye on Dec. 1 was 70.3 per cent of a normal, compared with 82.0 a year ago, and the revised figure for a year ago, and 87.5, the ten-year average.

The abandonment of winter wheat acreage during the winter of 1931-32 was 10.7 per cent of the average sown, compared with an abandonment of 5.9 per cent in the winter of 1930-31 and 12.4 per cent, the average for the ten years 1920-29.

Winter wheat a year ago was sown on 38,682,000 acres, the acreage harvested this year was 33,656,000 and production was 462,151,000 bushels.

Rye a year ago was sown on 3,712,000 acres, the acreage harvested was 3,271,000 and production was 39,855,000 bushels.

THOUSAND DOLLAR MARK REACHED BY CHRISTMAS SEALS

The 1932 Christmas seal sale has passed the thousand dollar mark, Mrs. Frank Chambers, chairman, reported Wednesday morning. The goal set for Lane county is five cents per capita, or over \$2700.

Many who received seals in the mail have not yet returned them or paid for them. The sale in the public schools of Eugene is still on, with no official report on its success turned in to headquarters as yet. Approximately half of the county schools have sold all the seals possible and reported. Most of the health centers have not made complete returns. There are still a few campus living organizations which have not sent in their contributions. There is still a seal sale booth at the postoffice. Self-sellers are on duty at the Coe Stationery company "at the sign of the Lorraine cross," at McMorran and Washburne's, the postoffice, and the Hoffman building. It is on these remaining sources that the Lane County Public Health association seal sale committee is pinning its hopes for attainment of its aim before Christmas.

At the end of the first week, over \$400 had been turned in. The second week's receipts brought the total to \$800. Now at the end of the third week, with Christmas less than a week away, the amount is but \$1000. If the goal of \$2700 is reached, nearly twice as much money must be turned in this week as during the first three weeks of the sale all together.
