by the house and sent to the senate are: Legalize beer, ale, porter and lager beer of 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight or four per cent by volume.

Provides a tax of \$5 on each 31-gallon barrel, as compared with the existing war time tax of \$1 a barrel. Provides federal protection to dry states on the basis of the Webb-Kenyon and Reed "bone dry" laws. Becomes effective 30 days after enactment.

Increases existing occupational or license tax on brewers from \$100 to \$1,000 annually.

Requires wholesale distributors to pay an annual federal license fee of \$50 and retailers \$20.

Dry States Protected

Allows sale in any licensed place where such sale is not in conflict with state or local laws.

Permits distribution of beer in barrels, bottles, casks, kegs or other containers sealed and labeled.

Prohibits brewers from obtaining licenses to operate in dry states.

Provides penalties for violations. In addition, advocates claim it will produce \$300,000,000 annually in revenue on a possible consumption basis of 80,000,000 barrels as contrasted with treasury estimates of \$125,000,000 to \$150,000,000, on a probable consumption of 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 barrels.

out of Coos bay at 8 a. m. and was believed to be in the midst of the gale. On Coos bay a southeast wind beat along with a velocity of 45 miles an hour.

Meager reports from Cape Blanco in Curry county, coming over wires straining under a southeast hurricane indicated the worst storm of the year was sweeping the southern Oregon coastline. The wind was said to have reached a velocity of 90 miles an hour.

WIND STRONG HERE

While a brisk wind was "de-hatting" many citizens on the streets of Eugene Thursday, blowing down a few signs and causing a few fires, a 35-mile wind, coming from the southwest, whipped the Lane county coast off and kicking up a high surf and bringing promise of still greater wind velocity before the day was over.

Reports from the U. S. coast guard station near Florence said the wind, accompanied by a hard rain, started shortly after 10 o'clock Thursday morning, reaching a velocity of 35 miles an hour and then abating somewhat. Indications were that it would increase within 24 hours, guard officials stated.

At Eugene the wind came in gusts, ranging from 20 to 25 miles an hour in velocity. The sudden blows caught many citizens unawares and blew hats in every direction.

Two fire fires, one at 1247 Eighth avenue west and one at 288 Sixth avenue west, called out the fire department just before noon.

STORM INCREASES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 22.—(AP)—A roaring, raging gale, described by shipping men as by far the worst storm of the season, lashed and buffeted the North Pacific today while rain squalls and thick mist added to the difficulty.

At 8 a. m. the Columbia river and Swiftsure bank lightships reported a gale from the south with velocity of 75 miles an hour. The barometer on the wildly tossing Columbia lightship stood at 29.43, and on the Swiftsure bank vessel, to the north at 29.20 inches. Both ships reported rough, confused seas and huge swells.

age in receipts. The budget committee turned him down.

Fred Fisk said: "The opinion must hold good for all funds. It probably would apply to our \$116,500 delinquency fund."

Commissioner O. E. Crowe said that this opinion contradicts one formerly given by the attorney general, in which he said that \$10 only could be collected for the county school fund.

The delinquency item is expected to be the one protested—if any is—at the taxpayers meeting Wednesday, Dec. 28.

Twenty school districts in the county have been granted permission by the assessor to hold tax meetings to increase their taxes to cope with the county high school tuition law. This, and a decision of the present county court to allow the new court to make the levy, has set back the routine of Mr. Keeney's office about one month.
