A. Price of Vancouver, Wash., and two sisters, Mrs. T. J. Geer of Cottage Grove and Mrs. Cynthia Rhodes of Orland, Cal.

Mrs. McDowell was a member of the Pineville Baptist church and had lived in that vicinity since 1878. She was 69 years old and was born at Lebanon.

No funeral services will be held at Cottage Grove, the body will be shipped to Pineville for burial.

Clinton C. McCormick—Clinton C. McCormick, former Eugene business man who died at Merced, Cal., Tuesday, was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James H. McCormick, early pioneers of Salem. He was born at Salem May 19, 1882, and was married to Sarah Stewart at Salem 30 years ago.

He is survived by his widow at Merced; three brothers, A. A. McCormick of Portland; J. J. McCormick of Safford, Cal.; W. W. McCormick of Hollister, Cal.; and three sisters, Mrs. Ethel Haberland of Triangle Lake, Mrs. Jessie Hosselton of Merced, Cal., and Mrs. Juanita Ellingsen of Vaughn.

Mr. McCormick with his two brothers, J. J. and W. W. McCormick, formerly owned the Rainbow and Club cigar stores in Eugene. He was the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. McClane, who were among the first settlers at Salem. He was a member of the Elks lodge and was a Spanish war veteran. The McCormick brothers own a chain of cigar stores in California.

Interment will take place in Arlington cemetery in San Francisco.

Mrs. Jennie Rice—Mrs. Jennie Rice died at her home, 827 Mill street, Springfield, Wednesday night at the age of 74 years.
