

JOBLESS WAITER SHOOT MEN WHO REFUSED HIM JOB

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Benjamin Glatt, a waiter out of a job, believes that in real life—as well as in Greek tragedies—the violent action should take place offstage.

Five hundred members of Waiters union, local No. 1, gathered last night at Beethoven hall on the east side to nominate officers. At the meeting swung into action, Glatt, tipped up an aisle, and mounted the stage.

"Could I see you outside a moment?" he whispered to business agents Jack Lasher and Morris Turkel.

They said yes. He ushered them into an ante room, closed the door softly, and drew a pistol.

"I didn't want to talk to you," police quoted him as saying. "I wanted to give it to you."

Then, so police were told, he fired two shots that dropped the business agents. One was wounded in the groin and the other in the thigh.

Fiercely now, Glatt stalked back on to the stage, the smoking gun in his hand.

"I gave it to 'em," he announced, before the 500. "I took them outside so you fellows wouldn't get into trouble. I'll make the sacrifice for you men."

At a police station, he said:

"I haven't had a job for two years. My wife is starving, my daughter Sylvia has to live with her grandmother in Chicago. I plied with Lasher and Turkel six weeks ago to get something for me. They said they couldn't help it, they couldn't do it."

The next day, he asserted, a man who identified himself as a "go-between" visited him and said he could get him a job if he gave him several hundred dollars. Glatt said that infuriated him.

Police were told two factions in the union have been at odds. Detectives said some members declared that to get jobs they had to pay persons who hold no office in the union.

dents as the worst "blowdown" since the historic storm in 1921.

In Oregon, one of the benefits of the storm appeared to be the moving of the grounded freighter Sea Thrush, from its sandy berth at the mouth of the Columbia. She was being moved towards the channel, and salvage company officials said she possibly could be saved, after tugs had given up the attempt to free her.

At Astoria, store windows on exposed corners were broken by the gale, and numerous power and telephone lines were toppled.

Ships waited off the mouth of the Columbia, because bar pilots were unable to get outside to board them.

RIVER DOWN HERE

Snow capped the foothills surrounding Eugene Friday morning and slides were heavily overcast following a night of rain which totaled .30 of an inch. It was snowing Friday at McKenzie bridge.

The Willamette river had receded to two feet five inches. Reports from state highway office said four feet of snow blanketed the McKenzie pass. The Siuslaw forest office reported new snow in the coast range at an altitude of 2000 feet and the Cascade office reported 30 inches of snow at Cascade Summit.

A 30-mile wind whipped the city Thursday and the U. S. coast guard at Florence reported a 50-mile wind there. The south-bound mail plane was forced to land at the Eugene airport Thursday night and continued on to Medford at 7:40 Friday morning.
