

RESCUERS CONTINUE SEARCH FOR BODIES

MOWEQUA, Ill., Dec. 27.—(AP)—Rescue workers today began a search in the north wing of the Mowequa mine, shattered by gas explosion Saturday, for 14 men whose bodies still were in the workings 700 below the surface of the earth. Forty bodies already have been brought out.

Scouts placed on the entrance of the wing Saturday to bottle up the fumes were broken at midnight. The shaft was ventilated until 9 a. m., when weary comrades of the entombed men resumed their search, finding one body in the passageway outside the wing.

The search might take days, officials said. Rocks, dirt and timbers had to be tunneled through or pushed aside as the rescuers bored toward the missing men.

Immediate relief for the bereaved families was the pressing need of the little coal community. A committee planned to visit Governor Emmerson in Springfield in hope of expediting aid.

R. D. Coburn, vice-president of the Bituminous Casualty company of Rock Island, estimated that dependents of the trapped miners would receive \$200,000 under the state's compensation laws. The State Industrial Commission will fix the amount of each case with a maximum of \$4500 for a married man survived by children.

One funeral procession followed another down Mowequa's main street today as the village buried its dead.

Officials of the mine made out checks for lack of dead miners and turned them over to their widows.

Mrs. Frances Bean Dies At Springfield

Mrs. Frances E. Bean died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ella Lombard, in Springfield, early Monday morning. She was born April 20, 1852, at Litchfield, Maine, and moved to Ohio in her childhood. In 1880 she went to Wisconsin, where she taught school for several years. On March 21, 1880, Miss Frances Bennett was married to Dredell H. Bean at Star, Vernon county, Wisconsin, where she lived until Mr. Bean's death on July 7, 1913. She moved to North Dakota, coming to Springfield in 1922.

She is survived by two sons, William Bean of Viroqua, Wisconsin, and Joe Bean of Camp Douglas, Wisconsin, and one daughter, Mrs. Ella Lombard of Springfield, 12 grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren. She had been a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist church for over 40 years.

Mrs. Bean's life was typified by the following words: "I was a stranger and ye took me in, naked and ye clothed me, sick and ye visited me."

Funeral services will be held in the Pool-Gray-Bartholomew chapel in Springfield Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Interment will be in La Farge, Wisconsin, where Mrs. Bean had many friends.
