

COUNCIL TO DISPOSE OF TWO MORE ELK; BONDS PURCHASED

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID
AUTHORIZED purchase of
\$2000 in city bonds.
APPROVED purchase of
\$150,000 bond for city treasurer.
AUTHORIZED disposal of two
more elk.
DECLARED a house at 2440
University street a nuisance.
REFERRED petition for tab-
ernacle to judicial committee.
RECEIVED petition advocat-
ing prohibition of parking on
Nineteenth between Willamette
and Olive streets.

Eugene city officials were eating
elk meat Wednesday as a result of the
meat business the city fathers indulged
in at the December 12 meeting of
the council, when they authorized the
slaughter of two of the city's elk, the
meat to be distributed among the city
people.

Councilman E. W. Zumwalt handled
the disposal of the elk, the animals
being sold to Long and Son for \$50.
Turned into beef, the city received
775 pounds of meat which has been
distributed by Mrs. Ella Richardson,
city matron, and several pounds are
still in cold storage.

Tuesday night the city officials
each received a Christmas present
from Long and Son, consisting of a
choice bit of elk meat. The council
decided to dispose of two more elk,
leaving the matter to Councilman
Zumwalt.

Routine matters occupied the at-
tention of the council Tuesday, it be-
ing the last meeting of the group this
year. The next meeting, scheduled
for Monday, Jan. 9, will see Mayor
Ella L. Lange, now holding office by
appointment, start his regular term
after being elected at the November
election. New officers and Vern Sco-
bert, newly elected councilman from
the third ward, will be installed. Sco-
bert is the only new member.

Permission to erect a temporary
tabernacle in the city was sought in
a petition presented by the Venden
brothers. Seventh Day Adventist
evangelists now in The Dalles. The
matter was referred to the judicial
committee and the city attorney.

Another petition sought prohibition
of parking on the steep block of Nineteenth
street between Willamette and
Olive streets. C. A. Horton and Carl
Stelmets presented the petition,
telling the council that during the past
three years five cars have broken
loose and run down the street, two of
them crashing into the Stelmets
yard at Nineteenth and Willamette.

The matter was referred to the po-
lice and street committee.
R. W. Rundlett, former city build-
ing inspector, filed application for the
position. It was referred to the city
engineer.

Purchase of \$2000 in city bonds
bearing five per cent interest was
authorized. They were bought on a
six per cent basis. A \$150,000 bond
for City Treasurer Fred Wentworth
was approved.

A house at 2440 University street
was declared a nuisance and a hear-
ing was allowed the owners at which
time they may state reasons why it
should not be removed.

Flier Missing Five Years Is Held Safe

Brazil, said today that a report her
husband is safe is "the most welcome

American Indians in the Rio Madeira
region near the borders of the Brazilian
states of Amazonas and Mato
Grosso.
