

BURRELL SUBMITS FOUR-FOLD PLAN FOR BANK REFORM

PALEO ALTO, Cal., Dec. 29.—(AP)—Alleged fallacies and shortcomings of the American agricultural and banking system were singled out and paraded before the Pacific Coast Economic Conference here today by scientists who dealt roughly with some long entrenched ideas in both fields.

Drastic revision of some of the current practices of banking was suggested by Professor O. R. Burrell of the University of Oregon in an address that drew frequent applause from the assembled economists of far western universities.

Burrell proposed the elimination of long term credits by banks and the limitation of capital expansion to savings and suggested that current production of consumer goods should be geared to consumptive requirements. These factors, he suggested, might in the long run substantially reduce or eliminate unemployment and "accomplish in effective and automatic fashion the major objective of so-called national planning."

A four-fold plan for reorganization of the country's banking system was proposed by Burrell as follows:

1. All banking to be brought under the regulation and authority of the federal government.

2. There should be complete separation of commercial and savings banking.

3. Branch banking should be permitted without qualification and without restriction.

4. The present federal reserve machinery should be maintained to serve the commercial banks. As soon as possible the long term credit element should be eliminated and the federal reserve system restored to its original purpose—that of assisting banks to function effectively as a medium by which goods and services are exchanged for funds and services.

This also was considered impractical with the result that the skunk, if eliminated, went without police propulsion.

three appropriation bills, including \$40,000,000 cut off the budget estimates," Rainey said. "We plan to continue the same proportion of saving on the other supply bills."

Rainey said 180 members, including 55 republicans, who voted against the sale levy last spring were re-elected to the new congress.

"For this reason," he said, "I don't see how it is possible to get it passed. I know when I am licked."

In proposing blanket authority for the president elect to reorganize the government, the Illinois democrat said "the present government is being controlled by organized minority including 500,000 to 600,000 employees in Washington who have been leading the raids on the treasury for their own benefit."

"Every time congress tries to effect economies these people send telegrams to their folks at home and within a few days members of congress begin to hear from home and the movement is blocked before it actually gets started."

Asked about the refusal of the democratic house to give President Hoover blanket authority to reorganize the government last spring, Rainey said:

"Enormous expenditures have been made under President Hoover, the largest of any administration since the world war period. The reason he did not get the authority was because the country lost confidence in Mr. Hoover."
