PALESTINE CAVES STORY

bone and horn. There were so many that the place appeared to have been a tool factory for the Monasterians. Many thousands of years later, in this same cave, shortly before the bronze age of almost modern man, there were sculptors. The head of a young deer was found carved in bone on the left of a niche. A small human head was carved on a rounded calc. In another cave, Mugharet Es Sukh, were found 8,000 stone "flakes" and "cores," hand made implements cut in the unmistakable style of Monasterian men. They may have lived there anywhere from 50,000 to upwards of 200,000 years ago.

Nine skeletons among the stone implements showed that these cave dwellers were closely akin in appearance to the stout race of Neanderthal men who occupied Western Europe during the last great glacial age. The positions of the skeletons indicated that they had been given real burials, by beings careful to place them in just the proper flexed positions which were almost universal many thousands of years ago.

A few animal bones were found, creatures of a mild climate, deer, wild oxen, pigs, horses, rodents.

In the cave of Mugharet El Tabun were Monasterian hand axes, abundant flint implements, and remains of rhinos and hippos. There were also fossilized human skeletons of a race resembling the Neanderthals.

would amount to a calamity so far as the counties are concerned, and they will never willingly consent to it. Mr. Hoss is not strong for the plan himself, so lets drop the idea.

"It seems that the plan adopted by the convention of county judges and commissioners is logical, sound, workable, less red tape, cures near all the patent objections to our present plan and deals fairly with all concerned, except those who 'doggedly hold out for a flat \$3 fee."

"Here is the plan: 'We propose a flat fee of \$5 plus 2 per cent on the factory price of the car for the first year, \$5 plus 2 per cent on 75 per cent of factory price the second year, and so on with a 25 per cent reduction each year until the fifth year, and thereafter only the \$5 flat fee would be collected."

Truck fees will remain as they are now. There would be no objection, however, to the raise suggested in Mr. Hoss' plan on commercial trucks and buses which he figured would bring in \$500,000. In fact, all courts would endorse it. Gas tax will remain at 4c but be made to include all motor fuel used in cars and trucks, dividing it 50-50 with the counties, the 2c of the counties to be in lieu of the \$1,100,000 secondary highway funds and \$1,800,000 the one-third of the license fees which they now receive, the distribution to the counties to be made so each will receive no less than they are now receiving from secondary funds and from one-third auto license fees, Multnomah not being required to split on her license fees basis, with other counties. This would cure another injustice in the gas tax law and it would seemingly require no argument other than to say that 75 per cent of local travel is done on county roads burning up this 4c gas tax and the counties receive not one penny of this gas tax to maintain these roads. It has always been unfair to the counties and should now be corrected. The governor's committee failed to correct this.

Red Tape Cut
"Then, to sum up on the basis of the above plan, we itemize as follows: \$5 flat tax \$1,325,000 2 per cent tax 2,000,000 Trucks and trailers 1,250,000 2c on gas to state 3,000,000 Miscellaneous 225,000 Additional fees on trucks and buses 500,000

Total \$3,300,000
The 2c gas tax going to the county in lieu of secondary highway fund, \$1,100,000, and one-third license fees \$1,800,000, we find that the state's requirements will be as follows: Debt service \$3,300,000 Maintenance 2,000,000 Administration, etc. 900,000 Match with federal 750,000 Deficit bonds 750,000

Total \$7,700,000
"Thus we show a balance of \$800,000 which with the increase that will surely come in both cars used and gas used, will pay gas tax refunds, police, and the secretary of state for administration. The county would receive \$1,100,000."

property including the elementary school tax which is retained by the counties. Multnomah county will be required to raise \$1,831,538, of which \$1,078,973 will go to the state. Marion county's apportionment will be \$246,944 of which \$145,478 will go for state purposes. Lane county, the third highest, has been apportioned \$241,867 of which \$142,191 goes to the state.

Clackamas county's apportionment will be \$227,834 of which \$134,219 will go to the state. Umatilla county's figures were set at \$208,868, of which the state will get \$119,979. Elkhart county will be asked to raise \$189,005 of which \$111,892 goes to the state. Washington county's share is \$153,113, of which \$90,200 goes to the state.

Apportionments to other counties include Baker county \$91,996 of which the state gets \$54,195; Benton county \$74,801 of which \$43,771 goes to the state; Douglas county \$145,059 of which \$85,454 goes to state; Jackson county \$148,289 of which \$87,355 goes to state; Josephine county \$38,400 of which \$21,443 goes to state; and Union county \$90,279 of which \$53,184 goes to state.

Boundary Board To Meet Tuesday

be killed. He was shot down without warning as he drove into the service station where Abernathy was employed. After killing the officer, the negro then drove to the captain's home where he apparently burst in upon Mrs. Wesely and killed her.

From the Wesely home he went to the Palmer residence where he apparently killed Captain and Mrs. Palmer without a struggle. The two Palmer children, David, 12, and Polly, 10, escaped. David shoved his sister into a closet, slammed the door and ran from the house to notify post headquarters.

After killing Captain and Mrs. Palmer, Abernathy ran to the home of Lieutenant Matthews, and opened fire on him. Meanwhile, the provost corporal had been attracted by the shooting, and obtaining a rifle, ran toward Matthews' home. He found the officer lying on the ground and the negro firing shots into his body. The corporal then shot Abernathy.

Knew Victims, Too
Hallowan's name came into the case during investigation of the slayings, prior to Mrs. Judd's trial, as a friend of all three women. It was testified at the trial that he, with several others, was a visitor at the home of Mrs. Judd, and also at the apartment of Mrs. LeRoy and Miss Samuelson, Oct. 15, 1931, the night before the alleged date of the slayings.

He was subpoenaed as a witness by both prosecution and defense but was not placed on the stand by either side to testify before the jury which con-

victed Mrs. Judd of the murder of Mrs. LeRoy.
