

BUILDING ACTIVITY SEEN IN WEST LANE DURING PAST YEAR

FLORENCE, Dec. 31.—(Special)—A total of \$28,000 has been expended in building and repair work within the Florence school district the past year, according to a resume of the year's activities along these lines, prepared and published by the Siuslaw Or of Florence this week.

Second largest investor in a new home along the highway was Attorney J. B. Hall. Mr. Nute had invested \$2500 in his poultry farm and home and Hall has spent \$1500 in clearing an acre and building a home.
