(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1) clear up in the future. In 1920 the county voted \$2,000,000 worth of road bonds to apply on state highways. This has been cut down and at the present time there remains \$1,135,600 of the principal to be paid off. The peak of bond retirement has passed and the county's bill for this item is now getting smaller each year. The bonds are being retired at a cost of about \$78,000 a year.

The records of the county clerk show that every office in the courthouse is ending the year with a good budget balance on hand. The county assessor, with a budget of \$15,000 for 1932, will end the year without spending \$400 of it. The county clerk lopped \$2500 off his budget. Other savings include \$150 by the school superintendent, \$2000 by the sheriff, \$2000 by the county surveyor, and \$200 by the county treasurer.

The past year saw the completion of Lane county's great highway system assured. Lane county has the greatest highway system in the state no other county having a great highway mileage as Lane. This county has 311 miles of state highway already constructed and a great deal more contracted for.

Under contracts entered into in the last year the county will complete the McKenzie highway, Oregon Coast highway, the Sluway highway, and the Willamette highway, with the exception of small sections not now provided for.

This highway program in the county represents an investment of \$10,000,000, of which Lane county has put in only about \$2,500,000. The county spent approximately \$350,000 during the year on construction and maintenance of county roads and bridges outside of primary state highway work. Besides this amount, highway districts throughout the county spent large sums in improving and building local roads.

Some of the principal regrading and resurfacing projects included seven miles of work on the North Fork road, seven miles on the Territorial road and three miles on the road between Springfield and Jasper. New grading and resurfacing projects included two miles on the Seaside road east of Walker, a mile each on the Fox Hollow and Mosby creek roads, 2 1/2 miles on the Sluway road, and one-half mile on the Dealwood Bridge road.

Principal surfacing jobs included also two miles of work on the Canary road, and a like amount on the Bethel road near Florence. Next year the only new construction will be on the secondary highways, and this may be thrown out if the legislature kills the secondary highway system, as both county and state officials have proposed. The county contemplates construction on the Fox Hollow, Linslaw and Dealwood projects, and oiling on the Territorial and Springfield-Cottage Grove roads.

The county carried on its most extensive relief program of its history in 1932. The self-help plan was employed, with needy persons picking fruit and vegetables and canning on shares. The county cunned 104,000 jars and tins of fruit and vegetables and fish for use among the needy. This will benefit 5000 persons. More than 1600 families helped can the food. In addition, 23,000 pounds of prunes were picked, and 2200 boxes of pears picked. A portable cannery was introduced for the first time.

The cost of the common schools is carried in 64 per cent by the districts themselves, 34 per cent of the cost being met by the county tuition money, and but two per cent from state funds, Mr. Howard said.

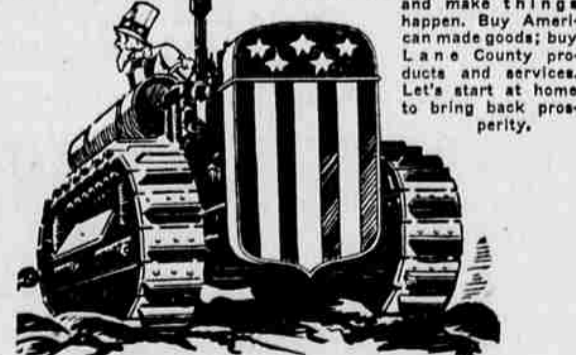
