

Trojan-Pitt Game and East-West Shrine Contest Scheduled For Monday

S. C. FAVORED IN ROSE BOWL GAME WITH PITTSBURGH



ASADENA, Calif., Dec. 31.—(AP) Southern California's football players—56 of them—were expected tonight to be above the Rose Bowl battlefield, while their opponents from Pittsburgh were approaching by train from their training camp at Tucson, Ariz. The man in the street probably will regard the winner of Monday's game as the national champion.

Southern California with a brief workout in the famous bowl tested the turf and atmospheric conditions and found them about the same prevailing a year ago when the Trojans stopped the Greenbacks from Tulane, 21 to 12.

The western team was in perfect condition as it sought its fourth Rose Bowl victory, a record no other team has had a chance to make. Pitt, too, with nine days hard work in Tucson's invigorating air, was reported fit as a fiddle and ready to score its first victory in three starts in the rose-scented environment. The Trojans will pick a distinct weight advantage over the invading Panthers but supporters of the eastern outfit suggest clever manipulation of the forward pass attack may nullify Southern California down to Pittsburgh's size.

Close followers of the Southern California team expect the visitors to complete some passes but they will be surprised if Coach Jock Sutherland's athletes are able to gain consistently through the powerful line, personally coached by Howard Jones. No touchdown has been scored through the line against the Pacific Coast conference champions all season.

STATE HOOP MEET SET MARCH 15-18; DRAWINGS LISTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 31.—(AP) Willamette university, Salem, will again be the scene of next year's Oregon State high school basketball championship tournament and March 15, 16, 17 and 18 were the dates selected here yesterday by the active board of control of the state association gathered in annual business session as in the past year will prevail.

Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Falls high school, was elected president of the board for the coming year, succeeded by Austin Landreth, principal at Pendleton high. Landreth will take Jackson's place as vice president. John L. Gary, principal at West Linn, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The invitation to the board to hold the state hoop tournament at Willamette university again was offered by Roy S. (Skeet) Keene, director of athletics and coach at the university.

Submitting his annual financial report, Secretary Gary stated an account of \$4,003.72 was on hand. The books were audited and given to the audit committee of which H. R. Johnson of Bend is chairman.

All amendments to the constitution, going before the general assembly, failed to carry except one specifying that a player "carrying three full and regular subjects, and doing passing work in them," be eligible for competition. Previously the requirement was carrying four full subjects and passing in three. The amendment was introduced by E. D. Towler, principal at Astoria high school.

As a result of the drawing for the tournament, the district 10 champions, Lane and Douglas counties, will meet the champions of district 6, Coos and Curry counties, in the fourth game of the elimination series. D. A. Emmerson of Cottage Grove is chairman for district 10.

ROB ROY TO GET ANOTHER CHANCE AT THOR THURSDAY

Vendetta! Revenge! A Scotchman never forgets, especially a descendant of Rob Roy, the old Scottish chieftain who had a reputation for cleaning up his opponents. The modern edition of Rob Roy will get his chance to maintain the traditions of his race Thursday night at the army when he meets Thor Jensen.
