

WILLAMETTE NEARS FLOOD STAGE WITH RAIN STILL FALLING

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

and south had some water over it in spots, surface water backing over Monday, but if flood stage comes and the rains continue, traffic is likely to be cut off.

Basements were flooded, sewer drains were spouting like fountains, and streets and side-lanes were covered with water in many sections of the city as the ground became unable to absorb the great amounts of water that came down in Sunday's rains.

Nineteenth avenue east was flooded over between Hilyard and Willamette streets. Fifteenth and Sixteenth avenues east were flooded between Mill and Oak streets and all side streets were flooded. At the intersection of Fifteenth and Willamette streets, the water spread out considerably, flooding the huge 500-gallon gasoline tanks at the service station on the corner. The Fifteenth and Oak street intersection was also covered.

Amazon On Rampage

The Amazon was raging Monday. The Chambers street entrance to the airport was blocked to traffic, the water swirling over the bridge there to a depth of about a foot.

The mill race was still within its banks up to Monday afternoon but in several places water was ready to break over. Low lands adjacent were flooded with the surface water.

The south highway, just beyond Judd's point, had water over it Monday, but it was surface water from the nearby fields and hills, the river not coming up to the road until in the afternoon. The highway office had stakes over the road route by Monday morning, ready for a flood condition.

Houses Marooned

Villard street was flooded in places near the railroad tracks. South Alder street sections were also flooded in parts.

Out by the Ferry street bridge, the "jungles" were becoming flooded Monday and two or three of the houses there were marooned Monday morning. The water so far is a long way from the highway and bridge approach, however.

All sections of the county reported heavy rains for Sunday, although in some places it was snowing Monday. The coast guard station at Florence reported a severe storm Sunday night, a 60 to 65-mile wind whipping the coast, and torrents of rain falling. A heavy surf was also reported. Monday morning found the coast section more calm, however, although rain was falling at intervals. The north fork was way up. An Eugene undertaking firm was unable to get through for a funeral.

McKenzie Is High

Cottage Grove reported unusually heavy rain Sunday night. Basements in the city were generally flooded but the river was not overflowing up to the afternoon.

Junction City likewise reported heavy rains. The north Pacific highway has water over it in the Santa Clara vicinity, at places just north of Harrisburg, and also near Corvallis. The McKenzie was said to be high and very muddy Monday, but not over its banks. Heavy rains were reported for all the McKenzie valley.

The West Boundary ranger station of the Cascade forest listed a rainfall of 3.11 inches over Sunday. The river was up to 6.1 feet there.

The Cascade Summit and Oakridge areas both reported snow Monday. Oakridge had a heavy rain Sunday night and the river raised considerably by Monday when it started snowing.

The upper McKenzie and other high mountain sections reported snow.

SLIDES HURT UNEMPLOYED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—As a result of Portland's heavy rain and windstorm of yesterday, a strip along the side of Sullivan's Gulch at East Tenth street rolled down early today, damaging eight shacks of unemployed men and seriously hurting Joe Belich, 50, who occupied one of the shacks. Belich, asleep when the slide started, was found with only his head sticking out of the water-logged clay soil. Patrolmen Russell and Brothers, with the help of ambulance men, dug him out. He was sent to a hospital where it was discovered he had broken ribs and possible internal injuries.

Two other men of the settlement were slightly hurt but did not require medical attention, the police-men reported. They had to be dug out of the mud, however.

Willamette Up

The slide, about 75 feet long and 15 feet deep, had shoved most of the eight shacks several feet and left them at the edge of the railroad tracks in the center of the gulch. Only two of the shacks were demolished, but most of them were damaged. The earth that gave way, slipping down without warning, was filled in about a year ago to beautify the district along the new Lloyd Boulevard which runs along the bank.

Another slide in Sullivan's Gulch occurred later at East Sixteenth street where about two feet of mud and water washed over the Union Pacific railroad tracks. Trains proceeded over the tracks at slow speed.

From 5 a. m. Sunday until 5 a. m. Monday, Portland received 2.62 inches of rain, accompanied by the highest wind velocity of the winter. Suburban creeks were running haphazard today, but no damage had been reported. The Willamette river was expected to rise considerably at Portland as the rain was heavy over the entire Willamette valley and particularly heavy in the mountains and foothills at headwaters of the stream.

Storm Subsides

The local weather observer said the worst of the storm had passed over and the wind, which reached hurricane force on the coast Sunday, was dying down.

Other parts receiving excessive rain included:

North Bend 3.16 inches of rain, Grand Ronde 3.40 inches, Wolf Creek 3 inches and Kelso, Wash., 1.64 inches. Seattle had .70 of an inch.

North Head, at the mouth of the Columbia, which usually is more thoroughly drenched than inland

SALEM GETS WIND, RAIN

SALEM, Jan. 2.—(AP)—A 40-mile an hour wind lashed the season's heaviest downpour of rain on Salem last night and early this morning. Fed by rains south of here, the Willamette river raised 1.6 feet since yesterday and was reported still rising this morning.

The first day of the New Year was bathed with 3.80 inches of rainfall and the Willamette river registered 11 feet above normal this morning.

Heavy rainfall here in December brought the year's total to 39.24 inches, 1.05 inches above the mean average. The Willamette river reached 12.4 feet above normal during December's 7.78 inches of rainfall.

No rainfall was registered here during August and only 0.01 inches during September, the weather bureau reported.
