

LANE MEN GIVEN COMMITTEE JOBS FOR LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Jan. 5.—(AP)—H. C. Wheeler of Lane county and L. F. Allen of Willows were appointed chairmen of the powerful ways and means committees of the senate and house respectively. The personnel of all committees for the regular session were announced here today by the president of the senate and speaker of the house.

All the regular session committees will not function during the special session, but those having to do with resolutions and taxation will be kept busy. It was expected not more than five of the committee will be used during the special assembly.

Lane county's senator and three representatives as well as the joint senator received many appointments. Two of the Lane representatives are chairmen of two of the key committees for the special session. Earl Hill was named chairman of the legislation and rules committee, and E. A. McCornack was named head of the taxation and revenue committee, both major groups in the house named for the special session. C. A. Huntington, the third representative, is a member of the assessment and revenue committee for the special session.

H. C. Wheeler, senator, besides being named chairman of the senate's ways and means committee, also has been named to the following regular committees: education, engrossed and enrolled bills, federal relations, irrigation and drainage, livestock, Joel Booth of Lebanon, the joint senator from Lane and Lane counties, was named on the banking committee, in the senate, on the game, medicine, pharmacy-dentistry, roads and highways, and chairman for both the public buildings and institutions and the military affairs committees.

The complete personnel for the education committee in the senate includes Woodward, Hess, McFadden, Lee, G. W. Dunn, Wheeler and Byron.

In the regular committees of the house, Hill of Lane was named chairman of the rules and legislation committee, member of the highway and highway revenue committee, of the ways and means committee, of the bills and mailing committee, and the commerce and navigation committee. McCornack was named chairman of the taxation and revenue committee, member of the utilities committee, member of the agriculture committee, of the banking and corporation committee, of the counties and city committee.

Huntington was named on the assessment and taxation committee, the education committee, the game committee, and the election committee. The education committee complete for the house is made up of Childs, Huntington, Clarke, Cooter, Herman, Martin, Price, Walker, Weatherford, and Winslow.

REGISTRATION OF AUTOS FALLS OFF OVER 14 PER CENT

SALEM, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Motor vehicle registration in Oregon decreased 26,145 vehicles, or a loss of 14.95 per cent the first half of the 1932-33 license period as compared with the same part of the previous fiscal year. Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, reported in a six-month statement issued today. The registration of vehicles of all types since July 1 to Dec. 31 was 205,908, while there were 242,053 licenses issued a year ago. Receipts from all sources under the motor vehicle laws, including motor transport fees and mileage tax fees, totaled \$5,290,176.10 or a decrease of \$607,708.12 under the \$6,107,884.22 collected the first six months of the previous license year.

Commercial passenger vehicles showed the heaviest percentage of decrease in registration on the current report, the loss being 23.32 per cent. Licenses sold to commercial passenger machines numbered 630 while 811 were licensed the first half of last year. Other losses were shown as follows: Private passenger cars, 34,842 machines, or 1.49 per cent; commercial trucks, 871 machines, or 8.07 per cent; and private trucks, 1,134, or 7 per cent decrease.

Seasonal trucks increased 19.3 per cent with a registration of 853 as compared with 715 licensed last year. Exempt vehicles showed an increase of 45 cars, or 1.49 per cent, registrations of this class being listed at 3,071 during the first half of the current license year in contrast with 3,026 exempted during the half-year of 1931-1932.

More Than 2000 Register at 'U'

Students reporting for registration at the University of Oregon totaled more than 2000 late this morning. It was reported by Earl M. Pallat. At noon 1907 had drawn registration material and a considerable number are expected to report during the week, as graduate students have until Saturday to register.

Students who are employed by the university, a number of whom assisted with registration Tuesday, are also granted an extension of time to complete registration. Final figures on registration for this term will be made public at the end of the week.

Dorm Rates Lower At University and College This Term

Students returning this term to live in dormitories of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college were headed a pleasant surprise this week when they learned that rates for board and room will be reduced substantially for the remainder of the year. New rates, adopted upon the recommendation of Mrs. Genevieve Turnipseed, director of dormitories, will be \$26 per month for both men and women at Eugene, and \$25 per month at Corvallis. Last fall rates at Eugene were \$32 for men and \$40 for women and at Corvallis were \$31 for men and \$29 for women.

An even greater drop in cost is shown from last year. Rates then approximated \$38 for men and \$36 for women at Eugene, and \$34 for men and \$30 for women at Corvallis. Rooms in dormitories at Eugene have more furnishings than those at Corvallis, necessitating a charge of \$10 more per month. Mrs. Turnipseed explained. The new basis makes the rates at Eugene, Corvallis and the normal school at Monmouth approximately the same for all students living in dormitories.

Bank Deposits in Portland Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—A growth of bank deposits in Portland of \$715,835 between Oct. 5 last and Dec. 31, was shown in statements issued in response to the national and state bank call today. Deposits here reached a total of \$131,485,295 on the last day of 1932, as compared with \$130,769,910 on Oct. 5, 1932. Deposit totals on last Oct. 5 amounted to \$5,000,000 more than the figures of the preceding June 30 report and bankers say the current gain indicates a steady trend.
