is the most serious the institutions have faced since the original retraining began.

TWO FOLD TAX PLANS

Here, in summary, is the sales tax introduced in the legislature and sponsored by Governor Julius L. Meier:

EXTENT—Two per cent of gross sales of every firm or person selling personal property or services.

EXEMPTIONS—Sale of motor fuel, wholesale sales, insurance premiums, banks, personal services for ordinary wages, gross sales under \$100 a month.

HOW PAID—Monthly, by making under oath a return by the tenth day of each month for sales of the preceding month.

PENALTIES—For failure to report, five per cent of unreported tax; in cases where evasion is attempted, not more than 100 per cent of tax; fines of from \$100 to \$1000 in cases where firms advertise that they assume tax without adding to cost of merchandise; fine of \$1000 or six months imprisonment for refusal to make tax return or for making fraudulent returns. Sheriff's sales may be held on real property of firms to collect tax, as for other taxes.

PURPOSE—To offset the state property tax of three mills levied December 30, by the tax commission.

Companion piece to the Sales tax is House Bill No. 2, which would lower exemptions from present income tax to take in more small incomes and would increase rates from 1% to 2% in the low brackets and from 5% to 7% at the top.
