First Lieutenant E. S. Prouty (D. O. L.), assistant professor of military science and tactics at the University of Oregon, died Friday morning at the Pacific Christian hospital.

Lieutenant Prouty had been with the R. O. T. C. at the university for two years and three months. He was in the military service for 14 years, serving during the World War, too. He was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and was at Oxford for one year. He graduated from the Infantry school at Fort Benning, Georgia. He was a member of the Masonic lodge.

He was born January 2, 1893. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ruth Prouty; one daughter, Mary Lee Prouty; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Byron Prouty, of Lime Ridge, Wis.; one sister, Florence Prouty, and one brother, Ernest Prouty, both of Wisconsin. The Prouty home is at 1338 Eighteenth avenue east.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the home of Weir W. McPherson, 2437 Victoria Heights, Rev. Clay E. Palmer officiating. Intimate friends of Lieutenant Prouty are being asked to attend the service. The body is being sent by Braniff-Simon chapel to Palo Alto for interment.
