

EAR'S RAINFALL ON COAST HEAVY

CANARY, Jan. 6.—(Special)—The rainfall for the month of December 31 has been a record for the Pacific coast, the meteorological station in charge of W. H. Scott. The greatest amount of rainfall in any 24 hours was 2.44 inches Dec. 26.

The maximum temperature for the month was 71 degrees Aug 4 and the minimum was 10 degrees Dec. 11. There were 142 clear days, 116 partly clear and 108 cloudy. Thirty days showed light fog, and 17 mornings of dense fog. The first killing frost was on Oct. 6 and there were 10 days of freezing weather. The total snowfall was five inches which fell in the early part of the year.

The month of December was extremely wet, the precipitation being 37.7 inches, the heaviest in 24 hours being 2.44 inches Dec. 26. The maximum temperature was 55 degrees and the lowest 10 degrees. The greatest range was 29 degrees! There were nine clear days, nine partly clear and 13 cloudy.

There has been almost incessant rain so far this month and roads and fields are washed out or submerged. Business almost at a standstill. The first mail since Sunday came in yesterday afternoon and school teachers and others who were outside the holidays were able to return.
